Mr. Jackson inquired as to the status of the report to Congress which is being prepared for the Director. He was told that Mr. [redacted] was going over the reports of the various offices and would have a draft prepared by the first of the week.

Mr. Jackson stated that he had read the Look article and considered that it had been modified considerably, was more fair to the agency.

Mr. Jackson reported that he and Mr. Kirkpatrick had discussed an article with Telford Taylor that he was preparing for the New York Times and considered that it was generally accurate and did not violate any security regulations.

The Director said that he wanted to put on a strong drive for a career service and to get legislation for the agency which would combine the best features of the FBI and foreign service acts.

Mr. Dulles reported that he had had a letter from [redacted] who was threatening to wind up activities in Europe, and that [redacted] would be in Washington on 2 May. The Director said that it might be wise to let Mr. [redacted] wind up his activities, and that he wanted to see Mr. Brown.

Mr. Dulles reported that he had a detailed report on [redacted] activities in the Far East.

Mr. Dulles reported that he had a recommendation for the SHAPE clandestine committee.

Mr. Dulles said that [redacted] was arriving on 3 May and suggested that the Director give him a stag dinner on May 7. This was agreed to.

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DCI's, 26 Apr (cont!)

Mr. Dulles reported that [] of O/SO had been conducting conversations in London with General Anders and was prepared to report.

Mr. Dulles reported that the Director of the [] service would be in Washington on 30 April to hold conversations with O/SO.

Mr. Wolf said that he had the regulation of the PRC, which he had reduced to one page, but that he would like to hold it for another day or two.

Mr. Wolf reported that he was taking a thorough look into our bank account arrangements on unvouchered funds and was not satisfied with present conditions and probably would change the system.

The Director commented on two items in the log: the arrangements made in the Philippines by Ambassador Cowan, and the inducement of the wire-weavers in Europe. He directed that a letter of appreciation be written to Ambassador Cowan and that O/SO be commended for its wire weaver operations.
