Official Diary

Monday, 3 December 1951

The DCI discussed briefly with Mr. Jackson and myself the organization of his Office. He approved the replacement of [] by Mr. Davidson of OCI and the move of [] to the office presently occupied by [] and []. The DCI also suggested that [] and one other girl be moved into the office presently occupied by []. If this were done, he did not feel that he would require another military aide. With respect to organization of the Office, the DCI indicated that he wished to be fully informed on all activities of CIA and noted specifically:

1. A schedule of conferences carried on by the various offices;
2. The desirability of making available to him a check list of significant papers received, so that he could request any that he desired to see personally;
3. The addition of Captain Giniger, MI Reserve, presently Vice President of Prentice Hall, to the staff of assistants.

Discussed the assignment of Captain Giniger with Mr. Wisner who agreed that he could be most usefully employed, initially, as an assistant to the DCI, and we would be able to make a later determination where he should ultimately be placed. At Mr. Wisner's suggestion, I undertook to talk to George Brewer about this and left a call with his office.

Set up a meeting for 10:30 Saturday morning in Kingman Douglass' office to discuss specialists in Truscott's command, such meeting to be attended by Drs. Chadwell and Millikan and Messrs. Douglass and Kirkpatrick.

Mr. Babbitt of FCDA phoned and stated that he had a problem with respect to communications and arranged to chat with me at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon.

Discussed with Mr. Dulles Col. Hansen's memorandum respecting public relations policy of CIA. Mr. Dulles requested that he speak to Col. Hansen and suggest:

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1. That the suggestion be rewritten, maximum to be 2 or 3 typewritten pages;
2. That the objective of the survey be recast to determine whether and to what extent a desirable policy could be worked out within the framework of NSC 12.

Mr. Dulles gravely doubted whether the Director would be willing to request a revision of NSC 12.

Obtained Mr. Dulles' concurrence to DD/A's proposal for a revised CIA Regulation subject to checking with DD/A as to the nature of the manual that will be put out in unrestricted form.

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
