Mr. Dulles:

a. Noted he had received a call from Joe Phillips of State concerning the Princeton Statement and reported that in view of Gen. Eisenhower's speech at the American Legion Convention he (Mr. Dulles) felt that the Princeton Statement was now academic; however, he had no objection to State using it in part or whole as they desired and had so informed Phillips.

b. Reported there was a "major battle" going on [redacted] and stated that we would do well to keep out of this affair at the present time. After some discussion, DDCI noted that he would discuss this situation with "J" when he saw him on 28 August.


d. Stated that he and Mr. Becker planned to talk to a representative from the Department of Justice [redacted] and the Lattimore case and he proposed to advise the Justice representative that [redacted] [redacted] operated under a classified directive and, therefore, no further information could be made available. The Director approved and stated that the Department of Justice should also be informed that no further information [redacted] would be made available unless the President so directed, which it was believed he would not do. Mr. Becker noted that he and D/DCI would attempt to persuade the Department of Justice to withdraw the first count against Jarvinen. The Director approved.

Mr. Wisner:

a. Referred to the stories in LIFE and NEWSWEEK concerning the recent Egyptian coup and noted since CIA was not mentioned there was nothing for us to do in this regard. The DCI approved.

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b. Noted a report furnished by a Foreign Service officer in Paris concerning his attendance there at a meeting of the Wiley Committee and stated that the report indicated that Senator Wiley had made a statement that he had been informed by personnel of CIA that RFE received its money from that Agency. After some discussion, the Director stated there was nothing further we could do at this time in regard to this matter; however, he would personally see Senator Wiley upon his return to the U.S. In connection with Wiley's statement, the Director stated that in all probability Wiley had picked up his information concerning RFE at a briefing he (the DCI) had given for the President, Cabinet Members and certain selected Congressional leaders.



d. Raised the question of visits of Senior Representatives approximately every six months to the U.S. for consultation and noted that at the present time [redacted] were the only individuals due for return for this purpose. The Director stated that the Senior Representatives would visit the U.S. every 6 to 8 months for consultations and approved such a visit for [redacted]. Mr. Wisner then noted that [redacted] was about due

e. Noted that the [REDACTED] Paper would probably be discussed at the next PSB meeting and recommended the DCI's approval.

Mr. Becker:

a. Reported that he had called the office of the Commandant of the Coast Guard as directed by the DCI and that organization was well satisfied with the intelligence support it was now receiving.

b. Referred to an article in the NEW YORK TIMES by Salisbury concerning Russian production and stated that an examination of this article indicated there was no security leak involved.

c. Noted he and DD/P were conducting a joint survey of the requirements of the Intelligence offices and the potential intelligence facilities of the Operational offices.
