Mr. Dulles:

a. Raised the question of the size of the German station and noted that he intended to discuss this problem with Gen. Truscott during his forthcoming trip. The Director stated that Truscott was directed "some time ago" that it would be necessary to reduce the complement of his station by at least 50% particularly in view of the fact that when we go on a dollar basis we would not be able to finance [redacted] in Germany. The Director went on to say that after the initial reduction as indicated above consideration would then be given to further reduction. Mr. Hedden noted that he had discussed this matter with Gen. Truscott when he saw him last and it was his understanding that some of the "complete units" now in Germany were to be moved elsewhere, e.g. Reproduction Unit. The DCI stated this was correct.

b. Briefly reported on a conversation he had with Under Secretary of State Bruce concerning the RFA program and noted that two low-level State reports recommended against it; however, Secretary Bruce had not actually seen them and had indicated he did not concur. Mr. Dulles went on to say that (1) he had advised Secretary Bruce of the Director's statement that CIA would not move on this project unless requested to do so by State as a necessary and urgent matter; (2) it had been generally agreed that broadcasting by RFA was a policy matter under the provisions of NSC 10/5 and, therefore, should be put to the PSB. The DCI approved and stated that (1) a paper would be prepared on this problem for consideration by PSB (NOTE: Mr. Wisner undertook to have this paper prepared); (2) if it was agreed that CIA should undertake this activity it would be incumbent upon State to advise us (a) the objectives desired, (b) the people to be reached; (3) if it was determined that this Agency would not carry out the project in question, he then desired such a statement in writing. Mr. Wisner noted that if such a program was not approved for NCFEA he firmly believed the morale of the Executive Committee would drop to a new low since they sincerely believed in its merits.

Mr. Wisner:

a. Stated that the Joint Chiefs had asked for a briefing on Europe and noted this request was probably generated by the fact that a similar briefing had been given to the Planners. The Director approved Mr. Wisner's recommendation that Gen. Weckerling give this briefing with DD/P being present and stated, however, it should be made clear in no uncertain terms that it was our considered

belief that there was no large latent underground organization which could impede the Russians if and when they started to "roll". Mr. Wisner noted that this belief had been fairly well dissipated in the Pentagon with the exception of a few die-hards in McClure's shop.

Mr. Hedden:

a. Reported that Corcoran had advised him that two people were involved in tapping the till of CAT and one of them had submitted a confession. Mr. Hedden went on to say that he planned to see Corcoran before his (Hedden's) trip to the Far East to discuss this matter and, after some discussion, recommended that Willauer be made responsible for CAT operations. The Director stated that (1) we should either retain Willauer in such a position or take him out altogether, however, in any case the Treasurer of CAT would be solely responsible to the Board (CIA); (2) he was ready to entertain recommendations on this problem at the earliest practicable date.

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
