


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PREFACE

This report is one in a series on Soviet Ground Force and logistic installations being prepared for a DIA/CIA Panel. The series is being coordinated, published and disseminated by NPIC. The photographic analysis is being performed by the NPIC Photographic Analysis Group, the CIA Photographic Intelligence Division (NPIC), and the Production Center 1P1c (DIA). The photographic analysis for this particular report was performed by the NPIC Photographic Analysis Group.

In the interest of uniformity, the titles and letter designators for the facilities observed at these installations are identical with those appearing in the project requirement. When a specific facility is not observed both its title and letter designator are omitted in the report.

Titles and letter designators for the various facilities are as follows: (A) railroad service, (B) road service, (C) landing strips, (D) administrative and troop housing areas, (L) storage areas, (F) ammunition storage areas, (G) POL storage areas, (H) other buildings and facilities, (J) equipment storage/maintenance areas, (K) athletic fields, (I) small arms firing ranges, (M) driver training areas, (N) tank/assault gun firing ranges, (P) flat trajectory firing ranges, (Q) artillery emplacements (batteries), (R) infantry or combined arms field training area or courses, (S) special training facilities, (T) unidentified facilities or tracking activity.




FIGURE 1. LOCATION OF PROBABLE BARRACKS AREA, VOLOZHIN.

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**SUMMARY**

A probable military barracks area (Figure 1) is located on the southwestern edge of Volozhin (54-05N 026-32E). The area is not rail served. Urban streets provide access to the installation.

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


FIGURE 3. PROBABLE BARRACKS AREA, VOLOZHIN. Sketch compiled from [redacted] February 1964.

The installation covers approximately 150 acres and contains four administration buildings, nine multistory barracks, eight storage and 17 support buildings, six vehicle sheds, one vehicle park, one small revetted building, and an athletic field (Figures 2 and 3).

The area is covered by 1956 TALENT photography and four KEYHOLE missions between March 1962 and February 1964. Comparative analysis reveals a great increase in activity. The area has doubled in size and three multistory barracks, five storage buildings, 17 support buildings, one administration building, one vehicle shed, and a vehicle park have been added.

**DESCRIPTION OF INSTALLATION**

**Road Service**

Urban streets provide access to the installation.

**Administrative and Troop Housing Areas**

Area D1 contains two multistory barracks and three support buildings which were first observed on July 1963 coverage.

Area D2 contains two administration buildings and six multistory barracks.

Area D3 contains one administration building, one multistory barracks, and six support buildings which were first observed on July 1963 coverage.

**General Storage Areas**

Area E1 contains three storage buildings. Area E2 contains one administration building, five storage buildings, and two support buildings. The five storage and two support buildings were first observed on July 1963 coverage.

**Ammunition Storage Area**

Area F contains one revetted possible ammunition storage building.

**Other Buildings**

There are two other small support buildings at the installation, one in a fenced area, which have been added since 1956.

**Equipment Storage/Maintenance Areas**

Area J1, first observed on July 1963 coverage, contains one 280- by 65-foot vehicle shed with one attached support building, and one 450- by 350-foot vehicle park.

Area J2 contains two 180- by 55-foot vehicle sheds.

Area J3 contains three support buildings and three vehicle sheds measuring 180 by 55 feet, 220 by 65 feet, and 280 by 40 feet. The three support buildings have been added since 1956.

**Athletic Field**

Area K is an athletic field which appears to have moderate usage during the summer months and reduced usage during the winter.


