Munich Request for Information on  
Josef VEINTIMILLE

1. Re Munich's request in reference, AECASSOWARY/28 obtained the following information (dated 4 October '56) on Josef VEINTIMILLE from Father Maurice VAN DE MAELE, the General Vicar of the Apostolic Visitation (Archbishop BUCHKO) in France. VAN DE MAELE's information is allegedly based on personal conversations with VEINTIMILLE:

VEINTIMILLE was arrested by the MVD in Germany (date not specified) for political motives and was sentenced to ten years' labor in a concentration camp. During his imprisonment, VEINTIMILLE made the acquaintance of many Ukrainian prisoners among whom were Yuriy SHUKHEVICH and Father Mikola BUCHKO (see OFFA 21724, 15 June '56). VEINTIMILLE claimed to have known Yuriy SHUKHEVICH very well and that the latter was one of his students (sic). From France VEINTIMILLE is alleged to have written to SHUKHEVICH who was still in prison. VEINTIMILLE made the acquaintance of Father Mikola BUCHKO while they were both at the repatriation camp located at Bikova near Moscow. VEINTIMILLE and Francois

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+PETIT (since his arrival in France, the latter has been known by HUSCHKO as an intelligence swindler) were turned over to French authorities by the Soviets in Berlin toward the end of 1955. They immediately came to Paris where they were sent to the hospital at Boulogne for check-ups. While still in the hospital, VEINTIMILLE wrote a letter to Father VAN DE MAELE asking to meet with the latter in order to tell him about Father HUSCHKO with whom VAN DE MAELE was already in correspondence. VEINTIMILLE wanted to discuss with VAN DE MAELE the steps necessary to arrange for the liberation of HUSCHKO and for his entry into France. When VEINTIMILLE and PETIT were released from Boulogne Hospital, VAN DE MAELE put them into contact with the Bandierites in Paris. On the basis of an interview with VEINTIMILLE and PETIT, Boris VITOSHIENSKII, editor of Ukrainian-Soviet, wrote a long article concentrated in a large part to Yuri HUSCHKOVICH. After VEINTIMILLE left Paris for Marseilles, he continued to write to VAN DE MAELE regarding the Mikala HUSCHKO affair and asking at the same time that VAN DE MAELE put him in contact with some serious Ukrainians. The Bandierites allegedly wrote to VEINTIMILLE in Marseilles but never received an answer from him. According to VAN DE MAELE, VEINTIMILLE's last known address was: Vallee du Marinier, L'Estagne, Marseilles.

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
