SUBJECT: General-- REDWOOD/Psych/AECROAK/AEPARADE/AERODYNAMIC/AESPRINKLE

Specific- Progress Report for period 11-30 Sept. 1957

ACTION REQUIRED: See Paragraphs two & three

Synopsis:

AECROAK broadcasts featuring "latest news and comments" produced by AECROAK-Athens went on the air beginning 12 September. Since then a fresh tape has been sent to PYREX daily for broadcasting, Monday through Thursday. Two or three miscellaneous tapes made up of scripts from most recent broadcasts plus scripts produced by PETHURST were turned over each Friday to PYREX for airing over the weekend. (There are no deliveries of tapes to PYREX on Saturdays and Sundays.) AEPARADE and AERODYNAMIC tapes were run according to previously established schedule. Soviet jamming was somewhat lighter during the latter part of September (see para 1-c below). PETHURST has found an apartment half way between Athens and Psychico, and is planning to move in as soon as his household effects arrive from the States.

Account of Developments:

1. Radio Broadcasts:

a. All broadcasts continued in same manner as before, both scheduled and random. The scheduled broadcasts were run daily as follows:

b. The following tapes were run during the month of September:

- 1) AECROAK: Tapes 586 through 607. Tapes 586, 587, 588 and 589 were run from 22 August through 11 September. These tapes were run under the old setup going directly to PYREX when received at the Station. Tapes 591 through 607 were handled in accordance with the new procedure, going first to AECROAK-Athens unit for processing and then to PYREX for airing, bearing new numbers designated by the case officer. Thus, tapes run from 12 to 30 September were #1000 through #1013.
- 2) AEPARADE: Tapes 120 through 123
- 3) AERODYNAMIC: Tapes 89 through 92

c. Soviet jamming during the month of September, judging by the Broadcast Monitoring Logs, was substantially less consistent than at any time in the past. For the first time since the Soviets began heavy jamming of AECROAK broadcasts approximately three years ago, a number of tape runs were made with no jamming detected by the monitoring station. Many broadcasts were covered by a single jammer, probably leaving them fairly audible. Total jamming - free time during the month of September was 57 hours 34 minutes. In addition many broadcasts remained free of jamming 5 to 20 minutes after going on the air before the jamming would begin. In some cases Soviet jammers went off the air before the end of the broadcasts.

2. Leaflets

Project ANSPRINKLE has been dormant for some time and there seems to be very little chance that it will ever be reactivated. In view of this we wish to be advised by Headquarters regarding the position of ANSPRINKLE equipment

stored in the Station's warehouse.

3. Plans:

Our planning has been impeded to a great extent by absence of any information from Headquarters about its intentions concerning the future of AECROAK/AEPARADE/AERODYNAMIC operations-Athens. In SGAA 28766 we reported some of the possibilities existing here for developing new SR/PT operations and improving the effectiveness of the present ones, as well as the fact that this would require sending at least one more AECROAK type contract employee to Athens. An early decision by Headquarters on this matter would be appreciated.

4. Personnel:

5. Administration and Logistics:

For the same reason given in Para. three above, no steps have been taken in finding a safehouse or requisitioning own recording equipment. We are continuing as guests of ~~MEMPHOR~~ METAPHOR, using their recording studio and part of their office space.

On the day of our reporter's Mr. K. departure from Warsaw, Poland, N. arrived from Cracow unannounced and introduced to K. a Ukrainian student who wanted to meet K. The student, a young man of 25-28 years old did not announce his name and did not give his address to K. We shall call the student P. More information about N. is given in characteristics. K. has contact with him for about one year, has mail exchange with him and sends papers and books to him. Two parcels of books and papers were sent to him also by Prolog. It came out in the conversation between K. and P. that N. provided P. with literature he received from K.

In 1956 and in summer 1957 P. was in the Ukrainian SSR (stayed in Lviv, Kiev, Kharkiv and other smaller places) and was brought by his friends to meetings of illegal groups. P. is very well acquainted with publications in the Ukrainian SSR and with the general situation. He is particularly well acquainted with the situation in Lviv which according to his information is as follow:
