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1. [] and [] met AECASSOWARY 3 and 6 as scheduled at 1930 in front of the Haus der Kunst and then escorted them into the Hungarian restaurant located on one wing of the Haus for a Christmas and birthday (AECASSOWARY 3's) dinner.

2. The significant operational topics discussed during the evening (most of the evening was spent talking about non-operational matters) were as follows:

(a) [] told the AECASSOWARIES that DS 809 had escaped from the house in which he was being held in Frankfurt and that it was possible he was making his way to the Soviet Embassy in Bonn. [] said, quoting from FRAN-3629, prior to his escape, 809 had accused his partner, 808, of possibly being connected with Soviet Security organs. Further, [] remarked that only recently we had decide, before turning both 808 and 809 over to the Germans at Camp Valka, to let AECASSOWARY 6 talk with them with the view of possibly learning something from them of interest to AECASSOWARY 1. Now, however, it had been decided to retain 808 indefinitely, postponing of course, AECASSOWARY 6's interview with him until the problem of 809 is resolved.

(b) Both AECASSOWARY 3 and 6 were quite interested in knowing the details of the escape, and as best he could with the information he had, [] told the story of how it happened. AECASSOWARY 3 and 6 then both gave their opinion regarding 809's motive for escaping (that he was probably a Soviet agent, and after gaining American confidence by squealing on his friend causing the slacking of the guard on him, decided to head back to the Soviet Union via the Soviet Embassy). Surprisingly enough, neither AECASSOWARY 3 or 6 commented on [] remark that we had planned to have AECASSOWARY 6 talk with 808 and 809. Further, neither asked when AECASSOWARY 6 could speak with 808. AECASSOWARY 3 and 6 also did not ask any questions about what we had learned during our interrogation of 808 and 809, and of course, not knowing this himself, [] did not volunteer any information.

(c) Actually, AECASSOWARY 3 and 6 did not seem to be too excited about hearing about 808 and 809. [] sensed that AECASSOWARY 3 and 6 were a bit peeved at not having been cut in on the act earlier when 808 and 809 first arrived here, and when they heard the latest development in the case, probably got some satisfaction from hearing that 809 slipped one over on the Americans—something which could not have happened if "experts" like the AECASSOWARIES had been called in to handle their fellow countrymen. In any case, the topic was soon dropped and not reverted to the rest of the evening.

(d) AECASSOWARY 6 said he had met Slava MYKITA several times at Evhen HARABACH's place, and that she and he are pretty good friends now. AECASSOWARY 6 then continued talking about MYKITA, adding nothing, however, which was not already known to [] and [] as learned from AETRAPEZE and AECAPELIN I. [] told AECASSOWARY 6 to continue seeing MYKITA but cautioned him that it was possible she was sent here

as a Polish agent and therefore he should handle himself with her accordingly.

3. Instead of paying AECASSOWARY 6 a Christmas bonus as he did last year, [] gave him a better than average cigarette lighter. [] also gave AECASSOWARY 3 a cigarette lighter--a combination birthday/Christmas gift. These gifts were very much appreciated by their recipients.

1. At this meeting, the following operational items were discussed:

(a) [] told AECASSOWARY 6 that DS 809 had been apprehended the day after his escape from our custody, and that he was again under our wraps, probably being interrogated on the reason for his escape, etc. Other than say that he was glad 809 was caught and asked a few questions pertaining to how and where he was caught, which [] could not answer, AECASSOWARY 6 made no further comments about 809.

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(b) AECASSOWARY 6 said that over the holidays (6 through 9 January) he spoke with Slava MYKITA (DOB: 21 June 1932, POB: Peremyshl, W. Ukraine) and learned from her that she believes the Bandera people hired her in order to prove or disprove that she had been sent here by Polish Intelligence to spy on the Bandera Organization. She told AECASSOWARY 6 she thinks all the Bandera people are making fools of themselves in the process of checking on her, especially since they go about this in such a crude manner with almost everyone she meets at Zeppelinstrasse asking her naive questions which they think might give them a lead. She said she is completely disgusted with the whole routine, however, she gave no indication when she would break away from the Bandera crowd. Apparently news of her being under suspicion has reached other ears too because she told AECASSOWARY 6 that her request for aid in settling here made to several church and welfare organizations have also been turned down. She told AECASSOWARY 6 too that Ivan SALYAK, who had showed so much interest in her when she first came here, has turned his back to her, probably because he too suspects her of something. Other than this, she told AECASSOWARY 6 that her boyfriend in Warsaw called her on the phone in early January, the call being made to a local postoffice. As AECASSOWARY 6 explained it, she must have written to her mother in Poland and indicated to her how she could call Her (Slava) on the phone in Munich. The mother then could have given this information to the boy friend. Here, AECASSOWARY 6 was merely speculating, not having heard from MYKITA how all this was arranged, and of course, omitting in his speculation the fact that MYKITA could have written to the boyfriend instead of her mother, telling him when to call and on what number. AECASSOWARY 6, who normally did not suspect her of being an agent, said this phone call routine could have intelligence implications, and added that MYKITA'S stories about some of the places she visited in Poland, among them a well known resort, without explaining how she could afford these visits, also leaves him with some doubts about her background.

(c) [] informed AECASSOWARY 6 that beginning 1 January 1958 his salary would be cut in half because of budgetary slashes. Thus, he will now receive \$100 monthly in DM equivalent. AECASSOWARY 6 accepted this news without comment. He said he still wanted part of this amount to be put in escrow each month, and specified this amount to be 220 DM. [] told AECASSOWARY 6 what he wanted to do with the money. AECASSOWARY 6 said he would think about this and perhaps think of some way to invest it locally. In the meantime, he preferred that the money be left where it is.

(d) AECASSOWARY 6 gave [] two copies each of all the issues of PROLOGUE (3) published so far by the AECASSOWARY I group in PBPRIME.
