A/2 phoned today that when he came to the office this morning, he found evidence of someone trying to break into the outer door of the office; i.e., the door leading to their suite of rooms. He said there was fresh broken off pieces of paint on the floor and the lock looked like someone had tried to pull on it. He immediately sealed the surrounding area around the lock with cellophane to preserve any finger marks there may be, although he feels the door will be covered with their own finger marks.

A/2 said members of AERFFHIVE had been in the office on both Saturday and Sunday because they had held meetings there and that Prof. Shankowsky and F. Jurewicz had slept there on Saturday night. He said he had not noticed any of the pieces of paint on the floor before Monday morning.

I contacted the Office of Security and talked to []
[] said a cursory check could be made by a member of their staff
[] or else someone from Washington could go up to make a more thorough study of the situation. Since there was no evidence that anyone actually broke in, I recommended that a cursory check be made first.
