1. Subject arrived late April 1964 from YAVORIV, obl. LVOV to CHICAGO, Ill. to her sister Mrs W. LOZEMSKI who sponsored her immigration to the States. Subject will not however stay in this country but will proceed to her son Orest PYTLAR of Sidney, Australia, to join him there for good. Subject's immigration papers for Australia should be already in this country and she hopes to be processed soon.

Subject is Ukrainian, aged 73, widow, her husband - legal notary - died in SUDOVA WYSZNIA, near LVOV in 1954. After his death Subject moved to YAVORIV, where she lived as pensioner in Chervonoarmijska Street.

Subject is graduate of grammar school, of higher than average intelligence but with not too good memory for her age.

Under Polish regime, prior to WW II, Subject's husband was employed in his profession in SUDOVA WYSZNIA. During the war they moved to VIENNA, Austria. After arrival of Soviets to Vienna Subject's husband decided to return voluntarily to West Ukraine "because he wanted to die in his native land". Their son OREST refused to repatriate and went to Fuerth/Huernberg and then Munich, Germany. After their return to SUDOVA WYSZNIA in 1945 on a regular repatriation scheme the Soviet authorities took no reprisals against Subject and her husband but rather to the contrary, they favored them to some extent as an example for others.

PYTLAR, Orest - graduate of Geneva University (major in economics) during and after WW II maintained contacts with the OUN and at one time worked in Germany in propaganda dept. In late 40's he immigrated to Australia and at the present is employed with a bank in SIDNEY. He is married and has one daughter.
