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1. According to the letter dtd 1 Mar 1965 and received through Canada (Montreal) from Card. Sl. on 19 Mar 1965 there are no negotiations or contacts being maintained now between him and the opposite side. The latter keeps quiet and no one seems to be interested in talking now.

In case Dr Kl makes her trip she should be very careful not to let herself be used for the other side's interest. Card. mentions that so far they often wanted to use his person for their own purpose. The first thing the opposite side should do is to annul the administrative regulation of the KGB forbidding Ukrainian Catholic Church in West Ukraine.

Dr Kl should however continue her talks with the opposite side and in case a group goes to Ukraine to present her point of view there. But one has to be careful in all respects and therefore only citizens of USA and Canada should ~~not~~ be included. ("If a group goes, it won't be bad and ~~they~~ it can have even 20 people but only American or/and Canadian citizens.") He finally received the memo of Rev Soloviy given to Palamarchuk.

After his installation he hopes that there will come now a stabilization of our church abroad.

As to inclusion of a priest into group or rather who he will be he will let her know in time.

2. Dr Lev and L. Tolopko visited Dr Kl on 19 and 20 Mar, respectively.

Both pressed she should start with preparation of the trip immediately and not to wait until she gets the answer from Kolossova or Levishchenko.

Dr Lev mentioned Podgorny as the one with whom she will probably talk

"because frankly spoken, things are being decided in Moscow and not in Kiev".

Tolopko mentioned Podgorny and Polansky as those with whom she will probably

talk in Moscow. According to Tolopko, Dr Kl should get for herself not

a tourist visa but a normal one so that she could stay as long as she

wants and go to any places she finds useful.

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She should also chose a good deputy of the group because while she will have to conduct all the talks with people in Kiev and Moscow the rest of the group might go on sightseeing.

According to Dr Lev from what he knows in two years the church-problem in West Ukraine will be solwed positively.

Both wanted to know whether Dr Kl will really not give in on her demands prior to her trip to Ukraine. Dr Kl insisted on them and complained about Kolossova's and Levishchenko's silence.

Both suggested, and particularly Tolopka, stressed the point that they would like to get in contact with Dr Kl's friends from and around Round Table Club to work out eventually common pressure on Kiev and Mosoow and that along this line they would gladly let make use of "Ukrainski Visti" and "Hromadskyi Holos". They realize that there are too many things they won't agree upon but in some points like demands of greater rights for Ukrainian schools, culture etc. they could find common language with nationalists.

(N.B. The answer they will get is NO, they can start pressing Moscow and Kiev alone, everyone will appreciate it if they do.)

3. Oresta SZEPAROWYCH of 236 E 13 St, N.Y. 3, N.Y. received on 19 Jan 1965 a New Year telegram from TERNO Mykola of Alma Ata, Prospekt Lenina 103, dom 3, kv. 25. According to an "agreement" she ^{had} made with TERNO, a telegram should mean he was coming soon to the United States. This was the first sign from TERNO after many months of silence.

On 12 Jan 1965 he wrote her a letter saying that he has just returned from Kiev and hopes to stay now for longer in Alma Ata. Thus he will be able to wrpte her more often. He sends his greetings also to Hunenkos whose address he has lost. Asks about Oresta's wellbeing aso.

Oresta replied to his ltr and received another one from him dtd

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9 Feb 1965. Terno makes a few reminiscences of something like a pretty strong romance, mentions that he has happened to read about the visit of MAT to New York and advises her to see "Kremlivski Kuranty", that he has seen the film "Holova Kolhospu" and liked it, also. His longings for her are very strong and he would like to see her. Also asks for her picture.

In Oresta's opinion Terno probably is preparing the ground for his coming to this country.

Please check for his ^{visa-} application, we would appreciate very much to know in advance about his coming.

4. In Nov 1964 Oresta SZ. received a letter from Levon AKOPIAN of Erevan, 55 ul. ~~Araxianska~~ ^{Alavardiana}. He is brother of Gresha AKOPIAN (AKOPYAN), see report dtd 16 Sep 1964, p. 35, para 3. Levon sends his greetings, he is working now as driver on Arpa-Sevan construction, in Dzerzhk, Armenian SSR, and hopes to see Oresta when she comes to Armenia again in 1966 or sooner. Also promises to write. The letter is dtd 10 Nov 1964.

According to Oresta Levon is probably just like his sister an agent provocateur. She met him in Yerevan and he was the one who warned her of his sister after she arranged for some "scandals" with American guides and everyone knew about her. He himself played the role of an Armenian patriot who tried to escape abroad from the army, was abandoned by other co-escapers, caught and had to pretend to be insane. That's how he came out. He wanted to help him through American Consulate as he still was planning to get out of the Soviet Union, this time with Oresta's help. He is approx. 28-30 years old.

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5. According to our Source in Cleveland, MOLCHANOV Valentin, Soviet exchange student from Dnipropetrovsk, Ukr SSR was expelled at Christmass time from Carroll University. He was^a neavy drinker, used to fight , and the Soviet authorities "recognized" that he wa no good as representative of Soviet studentry.

6. According to our Sources in Germany, RUDENKO Grigori, 3rd Secretary of Soviet Embassy in Bonn, Germany is sounding out the opinion on what reception would be given to a cultural delegation ~~from~~ Kiev by Ukrainian emigres in Munich and Germany in general. So far ~~only~~ it is know that NAKONECHNA Anna ^{has} agreed to welcome them privately at her home.

RUDENKO is again interested in meeting I. Kosh and told it NAKONECHNA.

KRUK of Munich is telling everybody that in Mar 1965 he has been visited by RUDENKO at his house who asked why ^{him} he was not returning home or arrange at least for an exhibition in Kiev. RUDENKO should have asked him what was doing Rebet, jr.

7. Z CH OUN in Munich ,Germany received lately a letter from West Ukraine from one of Radio Liberty listeners. The author of the letter asks ~~Radio Liberty~~ them to confirm through Radio Liberty that they have received his letter by broadcasting ~~the~~ suggested in the letter sign. STYRANKA Myroslav approached Radio Liberty in Munich on behalf of Z CH OUN but when asked whether he was talking in an official capacity, denied it, saying that he presented the case only privately on request of some of his personal friends. The representative of the Radio Liberty asked him then to convey to Z CH OUN that they should send someone in official capacity and they appointed Dr VASKOVYCH Hryhor to conduct negotiations with the

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American Director of Radio Liberty. The latter requested Dr Vaskovych to present his case on paper.

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
