Ad VOLYNETS Chrystyna, Report dtd 16 Sep 1965 :

1. First contact with S. was made by Roxane , see respective report dtd 15 Sep 1963, part III, pp. 8 - 13 inclusive, para 12,13. Subject is listed under N 52, his colleague N 51 .

2. In August 1963 Subject met MANKO L. of Canada ^{in Kiev} and gave him one of his poems ,entitled Vantashnyk in handwriting. At that time subject did not expose himself to such a degree as in case of Roxane, he only limited himself to general opinion on situation in the Ukraine, role of the youth etc. He made no indication as to his connections with N 51 and the group.

3. During her second visit to Kiev, Roxane met N 51 and N 54. N51 told Roxane that he was called again to the KGB, 10 days after Roxane's arrival to Kiev. They asked him to find out what was Roxane's mission and whether she was working for Americans, to be more precise for American Intelligence. N51 should have told them that he did not think Roxane was working for Intelligence but probably rather she was to cover someone who was really collecting information. In other words ,she was to distract attention from someone who was doing real spying. Then the KGB told N 51 to report on everything he will find out about Roxane.

a. According to Roxane , N 51 was very poor, had no money, and on Jan 1, 1965 she had to give him 3 kopeyki for tramway. He also told her something to the effect that he had to robe some people to get money for living. His wife is a Hungarian. N 51 is employed now with some Institute of Communication. His previous job he had either to leave "voluntarily" or was sacked and worked in the meantime in four different jobs. Roxane left for his wife K\$20.- for personal expenditures. N51's wife stems from UZHGOROD, speaks fine Ukrainian. They have children.

b/ N 51 told Roxane about their activities. He claimed that his group had bought phosphorus and burned down the Kiev Library, in order " to awake the people's conscience... since Ukrainian people are to

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be strongly hit on their head until they move and react..." They planned also some other actions but were short of financial means.

N 51 planned to hang out Ukrainian flag on the top of the Palace of October Revolution in Kiev on 1 November 1964 but his wife and Roxane persuaded him not to do it. The plan was supposedly discussed at a meeting of the group (Roxane did not participate in it) and there discarded owing mainly to the opposition of N 51's wife. During the period when the plan was still "open", N 51 did not sleep at home in order to protect his wife from eventual repressions in case he would be connected with the affair.

N 51 claimed that his group knew personally POGRUSHALSKIY. The latter wrote many letters and protests against destruction of Ukrainian books in cellars of the Library to the Director of the Library and to the Director of the ^{Library of the} Academy of Sciences of Ukrainian SSR. He pointed out also at Vydubyttskyi Monastery where many a book get rotten and destroyed. After POGRUSHALSKIY'S protests and pleas were ignored he got crazy.

N 51 told Roxane that he also was planning to rob a bank to get money for their activities. The plan was already worked out in detail. N 51 had his people in the KGB and claimed to have no difficulty in obtaining necessary informations.

4. N54 was summoned to the KGB, too. They told him that Roxane had 7 articles about her sojourn in the Soviet Union and that 4 of them were OK but three - not. The KGB had some reservations about Roxane's presentation of the situation in the Ukraine and particularly about some individual cases. He did not say what they were. The KGB told him only some jokes Roxane was talking about, one of them that in the Soviet ^{Union} the people first get into a queue and then ask what is being sold. (A.B. Roxane was telling this joke at the Round Table but had written no articles. She had, however, altogether 7 speeches on her sojourn in the Ukraine.) The KGB told N 54 that despite the three speeches or articles they considered Roxane to be a sincere Ukrainian and if she really loved so much Ukraine and would like to stay in Ukraine, N54 should tell her from them that she could remain in Kiev and they would find her a job.

N 54 was the one who managed to get permission for celebration of Symonenko's anniversary in Dec 1963 at which SVITLA CHNEV Ivan held his speech.

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
