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During Dr Kl's attacks against KOLOSSOVA, LEVISHCHENKO and others for the empty promises and lack of activity to improve the situation in the Ukraine on their part, Subject stuck more or less to official line whereas TOLOPKO and his wife in many points agreed with Dr Kl as to Russification, passivism of people in Kiev aso.

The final result of the conversation: Dr Kl left open the gate for further contacts with KOLOSSOVA and others, and particularly with people from the Mission.

3. Among other things Subject and TOLOPKO told Dr Kl that in October 1965 a new larger cultural delegation is to be expected from Ukraine in this country and probably there will be no one from the old one. They could name however nobody and did not know yet who will head it.

PALAMARCHUK'S appointment to Marocco was a promotion and he should be succeeded by an even more important personality.

SHEVCHENKO, head of Ukrainian Mission in New York had gone for vacation to Kiev and he has already returned or will do so soon. CHERNIAVSKY stayed all the time in New York and "probably" tried to get in touch with Dr Kl by phone but she was never at home. CHER's wife went for vacation to Kiev.

In Detroit there has allegedly been organized a Society for cultural contacts with Ukraine and its chairman is a former DP.

Both complained against "Ukrainske Zhyttia" of Chicago, Ill "which had started to write like "America" or "Svoboda".

In tete-a-tete talk with Dr Kl, TOLOPKO told her that "it was a pity LEVISHCHENKO did not have higher position".

They, in Kiev, expect very much from emigration, particularly they want emigration's help in Ukrainization. They expected also very much from Dr Kl's trip to the Ukraine, all have asked Subject why she has not come because she could have helped them very much. KOLOSSOVA was sure that Dr Kl would come to Kiev.

4. According to TOLOPKO, CHERNIAVSKY Viktor told him that he understood quite well Dr Kl and if it had depended on him he would do it "completely different". "But what can I do?" "Dr Kl is absolutely right in many points but I am helpless".

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5. Subject and TOLOPKO "wondered" if there were still chances to organize a Society for Cultural Contacts with Ukraine in New York and whether Dr Kl's friends could publish a paper. Dr Kl "ignored" the topic pointing out that she had already talked about more important things with KOLOBSOVA and made it quite clear to them that without changes in the Ukraine they had nothing to look for in emigration.

6. Dr Kl and Eve left TOLOPKO'S house at approx. 22.15 hrs.

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
