A. CA Results

- i. About 35,000 copies of the AECASSOWARY INFORMATION BULLETIN printed specifically for Soviet Ukrainians mailed to the UkSSR. Some mail responses received.
- ii. Two issues, 2500 copies each, of an English-language quarterly magazine PROLOGUE published and mailed to subscribers in the Free World and to educational institutions in the UkSSR. Receipt in the USSR acknowledged by a 4 1/2 page attack in a Soviet Ukrainian historical journal.
- iii. Three Ukrainian-language publications, SUCHASNA UKRAINA, LITERATURNIA HAZETA and UKRAINSKY SAMOSTIYTYK published in Munich specifically for the Ukrainian emigration in the West, also were mailed (about 500 copies monthly) to Ukrainians in the UkSSR, Poland, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia.
- iv. An average of 10 books monthly were mailed to Ukrainians in Poland for transmittal to Ukrainians in the UkSSR. Receipt of almost every volume acknowledged in writing and requests received for additional books.
- v. About 3500 pieces of literature printed in the West were distributed to Soviets attending the Vienna Youth Festival and 800 letters containing literature printed in the West were mailed to Soviet addresses from Vienna during the Festival.
- vi. Sent emigre literature to an acquaintance in the Ukraine via repatriate from Canada.

- vii. Small number German-language books published in the West were presented to a Soviet Ukrainian writer who requested the books when he was in the West.
- viii. Established clandestine irregular correspondence with a former OUN member in the Ukraine via Canada.
- ix. English-language monthly DIGEST OF THE SOVIET UKRAINIAN PRESS published and mailed to a list of approximately 75 subscribers in the United States and abroad, plus interested CIA components.
- x. Hundreds of letters from the Soviet Ukraine to individuals in the United States and Canada screened for items of PI and CA interest.
- xi. About 72 hours monthly of Ukrainian language programs broadcast over Radio PYREX prior to cessation in October 1959.
- xii. Established an ABCASSOWARY representative in Turkey for future contact operations.

B. PI RESULTS

- i. Two senior operational individuals trained for supervising REDSKIN IN/OUT.
- ii. In summer of 1959, three U.S. citizens (two born in the Ukraine) briefed by the ABCASSOWARIES previous to trip to USSR. Result: Six reports disseminated by CIA, plus operational data very useful for 1960 Zakarpatskaya operations.
- iii. Contact operations at the Vienna Youth Festival resulted in 22 contacts with Soviet Ukrainians. One contact continues via the open mail.
- iv. Contact with a very prominent Ukrainian author and public figure during his visit in London. The Ukrainian revealed his nationalist feelings and extended an invitation to visit him personally in the Ukraine.
- v. A U.S. citizen, Ukrainian-speaking journalist, former swimming champion in the Soviet Union, was mounted to contact Soviet Ukrainian athletes during the International Track Meet in Philadelphia. Two reports received containing biographical information and results of his conversations with Soviet athletes. Information being utilized for Rome Olympics.

- vi. Written reports on approximately 20 conversations with Soviet Ukrainians at the Marseille International Trade Fair turned over to CIA revealed public opinion of Soviet Ukrainians toward the regime and produced one possible FI lead.
- vii. Package mailing operations to the Ukraine produced an exchange of correspondence and FI leads, and at least two reports of FI were disseminated.
- viii. One U.S. citizen presently being briefed prior to his visit to the USSR under the student exchange program.
- ix. One U.S. citizen presently being briefed before his trip to the USSR.
- x. Volunteered several interesting leads on emigres bound for the USSR.
- xi. Furnished leads on Ukrainians abroad who may be used by CIA as local station singleton assets.

4. SPECIFIC CIA TASKS UNDER TAKEN

- A. AECASSOWARIES were asked to determine changes in visa applications to Soviet Union following collapse of Summit.
- B. Supply a candidate for contact operations in Sweden.
- C. Contact operations at Vienna Youth Festival.
- d. Contact ops at Marseilles International Trade Fair.
- E. Contact ops at International Track Meet in Philadelphia.
- F. Furnished two Special Operations Chiefs
- G. Ascertainning of International events at which Soviet Ukrainians could be expected.
- H. Expanded mailing of PROLOGUE magazine and DIGEST OF THE SOVIET UKRAINIAN PRESS to include Asia and Africa.
- I. Lined up specialized personnel for summer 1960 contact ops season.
- J. Provided names of possible Ukrainian interpreters for President Eisenhower.
- K. Furnished background information on Oberlander case.

5. RECOMMENDED STAFF CHANGES

A field case officer is needed to direct and coordinate REDSKIN in and out in Europe via AEGASSOWARY/29. No meaningful results can be expected in Europe until this is done.

6. OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

Maintenance of group personnel and finances at present level until need for decrease or increase more clear cut based on Ops, CA and FI results.
