1. Introduction.

We have examined the information and suggestions contained in references A and B, as well as that contained in the other correspondence received from Headquarters and we appreciate this general guidance in establishing and maintaining AECASSOWARY 29 as a REDSKIN PA. However, we also feel that there are still gaps in our information which can best be filled in by Headquarters. We have had, unfortunately, only a few short discussions with AECASSOWARY 2 and AECASSOWARY 29 between their trips to Hamburg, Stockholm, Rome, Munich and Paris and we have not been able to obtain all the information we need from them. In some cases only Headquarters can provide this information. Therefore, this dispatch will comment on various administrative aspects of our handling of AECASSOWARY 29 as a REDSKIN PA. We intend to comment upon the operational aspects in another dispatch when we have had sufficient time to discuss our operational plans with AECASSOWARY 29 more fully.

2. Security, Cover and Documentation.

a. We presume that AECASSOWARY 29 has an operational security clearance of a high level since AECASSOWARY 29 has received certain Headquarters training and briefing. However, in order to keep our records in order and to make our relationship with AECASSOWARY 29 easier, we would appreciate receiving the date and type of clearance that AECASSOWARY 29 has, particularly with any notations concerning the limitations involved. We would like to be as open with AECASSOWARY 29 as we can. We have heard indirectly that AECASSOWARY 29 has received an LCFLUYTER and we would like to have the results of this test. We do not know what clearance AECASSOWARY 2 has or whether AECASSOWARY 2 has had an LCFLUYTER, but feel that this is not so essential for us. We presume also that AECASSOWARY 15 has been completely vetted, but this concerns us only insofar as AECASSOWARY 29's operational reports are passed to him. Finally, we would like to be informed whether AECASSOWARY 29 has received a full security briefing and has executed a secrecy agreement or whether we should execute such an agreement here.

b. From both the references and AECASSOWARY 29, we know that he intends to contact various members of his organization here for the purpose of establishing a spotting and development organization with which AECASSOWARY 29 will work. AECASSOWARY 29 states that these contacts will be made under his cover, but that he will select a few of these to work operationally with him on REDSKIN matters and that these will be witting of his true purpose for being in Europe. The remaining members of his organization who will remain aware of his presence in Europe will not know of the operational purpose of his being in Europe. We would like very much to obtain operational clearances as soon as possible on the few who will become witting of his operational mission here, particularly those who will also be witting of RUBBER involvement. Since at the present time we do not have any information on these potential contacts, we would like to have a complete identity list of members of AECASSOWARY 1 organization including any ex status and operational clearances.
