C. Readers' reaction to the recent issue of the Prologue

Articles on the nationality policy in the USSR evoked a wide interest among the professors and students of American Universities, especially 19 statistical tables included in the article on the "Effects of Soviet nationality policy." Professor Roucek of the Bridgeport University commented on the article that it had been "best he saw on the problem." Prof. Goodman of the New York University, Norman S. Field, librarian of the U. N. Library in Geneva, Prof. Kubiiovych of Sarcelles, Frances, etc. ordered additional copies. The condensation of the article will appear in the Urdu language in Pakistan. There is a flow of letters by American and Canadian students asking for additional information or sources. Miss Whillock of San Bernardino Valley College in California asked the Editor for help in preparing her paper on "Chukot National District in the USSR."

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C. Readers' reaction to the recent issue of the Prologue (continued)

The article by Prof. Dr. Bohdan T. Halajczuk on "Two Concepts of Peaceful Coexistence" was also favorably accepted by the leading internationalists in the USA (Prof. McDougal, Yale, Prof. William Fox, Columbia, Prof. William Roberts, American University) and in Latin America. Prof. Halajczuk had interviews and exchanged letters about the article which was found as "stimulating" and "up-to-date."
