1. The SIS divides the world into 3 "polosi" (zones, singular polosa):

- a. Bezopasnaya Polosa (Secure Zone)
- b. Vliatelnaya Polosa (Zone of Influence)
- c. Zamorskaya Polosa (Zone Overseas)

2. Bezopasnaya Polosa includes Russia proper, plus occupied or directly controlled countries: Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Rumania, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia, etc. It is considered the only place safe (bezopasnaya) enough to house the major SIS headquarters called Bazi (singular Baza, base), as for example Baza III/C/M in Prague, sometimes designated III/B/C/M (Third Base in Czechoslovakia under General MOLOTKOV).

3. Vliatelnaya Polosa includes the rest of Europe and some parts of Asia, such as Northern Iran. It houses only minor SIS headquarters, known as Bunkri (singular Bunker, bunker), like the Bunker 1/B-P/5 at Munich, sometimes called simply 1/B-P/5 - the first bunker headed by a man whose code name is P/5 (his name is Andrei PETCHARA). In addition to Bunkri, Vliatelnaya Polosa also houses very small intelligence centers, known as Bunki (singular Bunka, meaning unknown), as for example Bunka D/23 at Bayreuth (D/23 is the code designation for the chief of the Bunka, Petro DUDTCHUK).

4. Zamorskaya Polosa includes specifically England, the Americas, Africa, Australia, Japan, and some parts of Asia, like the Near East. Little is known of it from this source, except that in this polosa the SIS is trying to establish both Bunkri and Bunki under some legal camouflage, such as the various Ukrainian organizations and societies in the United States and Canada.
