MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD:

SUBJECT: Aerodynamics - English Language Publication

1. The Aerodynamics psychological panel is engaged in the preparation of the first issue of the English language publication that will probably bear the title of "The Nationalist". This publication will endeavor to promote Nationalism as an ideological issue designed to counter the ideological drive of Soviet Communism.
2. The thinking underlying the policy behind this publication could be summarized as follows: In the recent past the Soviet have tried to assume the role of the protector and liberator of the underdeveloped nations in the Middle East, Asia, and Africa. This drive is calculated to undermine the forces of the free world and in doing this the Soviets are accusing the United States, Britain and France of promoting "Capitalistic Colonialism."
3. The Ukrainian nationalistic movement in this country and in the world in general could be utilized to serve as a spearhead of a drive to counter the Soviet Communist ideology and to rally the forces of true nationalistic ideals on the side of the free world.
4. The ideological and social forces behind nationalism represents an antithesis of the Soviet Communist ideology which is totalitarian and international in its political philosophy. True nationalism puts the emphasis on the individual character of the nation and the country, it represents the centrifugal force inherently opposed to the maxims and ideas of the Soviet Communist, and for this reason, could be effectively used in countering the Soviet drive to subvert and alienate the underdeveloped nations of the world.
5. The proposed publication will strive to combat the Soviet propaganda and to show to the public opinion of the world that Soviet imperialism is responsible for the worst type of "internal colonialism" which reduces people and nations to slavery.
