Reference is made to your secret memoranda dated May 22, 1955, your reference CS CI-1224 and July 13, 1955, your reference CS CI-1463 to the Commissioner, Immigration and Naturalization Service, a copy each of which was furnished to this Bureau.

Inquiries have been made on the basis of information contained in your memorandum dated May 24, 1955, to the effect that your source of unknown reliability had obtained information from one Jan Piechulski, Petty Officer of the Polish vessel MS. "Mickiewicz" that Wojcicki (fnu), a seaman on the American ship "Del Norte" told him that subject had joined the crew of an unidentified Swedish ship bound for a United States port, where he intended to jump ship and infiltrate into the United States.

The "Del Norte" arrived in New Orleans, Louisiana, on July 21, 1955. Antoni Wojcicki, able-bodied seaman, Z #593584, was interviewed by agents of this Bureau on July 21, 1955.

He advised that Zygmunt Borkowski was unknown to him, and he possessed no information concerning any such person. He stated also that he had no knowledge, nor had he heard any rumors to indicate or suggest that any foreign seaman intends to jump ship in the United States. He advised that Jan Piechulski is unknown to him.

He recalled that the Polish ship "Mickiewicz" had been at either Montevideo, Uruguay or Santos, Brazil, when the "Del Norte" was in port there three or four months ago. On the street he encountered two crewmen from this vessel and drank some beer with them in a local bar. One was named Liszewski and the other Muller, or something similar. Wojcicki had known Liszewski before, they having sailed together on the Polish ship "Batory" during World War II. Wojcicki stated he could recall nothing about their conversation on the occasion of this social get-together in Montevideo or Santos having to do with anyone jumping ship and "infiltrating" the United States.

This information is being given to your Agency to assist you in evaluating the reliability of your informant. Any further information you may have concerning the subject and the possibility that he may enter the United States will be appreciated.
