CADROIT/CARBOHYDRATE

Date, Time, and Place of Meeting: 14 Sept 54, 1800-2000, C's home

Present: a. CARBOHYDRATE b.

1. CARBOHYDRATE delivered:

a. A Written report on the present status of the Lippmann case.

~~Entschlossenheits~~ L. is the cousin of Krebs who lived in East Berlin until recently and who was forced to become an SFS Spitzel under duress. Briefly, the report states that the SFS pressure on L. had become stronger of late. L. and his fiancée decided that it was not possible for them to stay in East Berlin any longer and fled to West Berlin on 12 Sept. They will go through the regular refugee processing. They are both currently staying with Krebs.

b. A written report on Lehmann, formerly with CADROIT, who was earlier approached by the SFS. L. was let go by CADROIT on 15 Aug and had hoped to set up a stationary store, but has not yet been able to secure an acceptable lease. He is now looking for work through the Arbeitsamt, while still hoping to set up the store. He has received some help from Prengel.

c. A written report re a former Wehrmacht doctor who was later expelled from Czechoslovakia and is now working with Wisnuth. The SFS has attempted to recruit him. The doctor did not come to CADROIT himself (his Ausweis would not permit this), but sent a girl friend of his for advice. C. advised the girl to go to the CALCINE house, which SPURGEON states she did.

d. Report by a former KVP captain re local KVP personalities.

e. Visitor's report re occupation of KVP of area near Spremberg.

2. G. reported orally that re the Simon who had earlier tried to get a job with CADROIT and who had ~~appeared~~ **SECRET** suspicious (repeated attempts), there were apparently two students named Simon living near each other who

are sometimes confused with each other. C. had sent Simon No. 1 a note requesting him to appear for a discussion, and Simon No. 2 had received the letter and appeared. The details on this situation were not yet clear, but C. promised a full written report for the next meeting.

3. C. reported that ^{MA} Captain W., presently in Giessen, had ~~written~~ written C. on 10 Sept stating his recognition had been denied and requesting further CADROIT aid. C. had replied that CADROIT had already given a Gutachten, and could do little more. [] agreed to look into having "the CALCINO house" follow the matter up, since the man had been earlier turned over to them. C. further reported in this matter that the MA who is the husband of the woman with whom the captain had fled from East Berlin had visited C. on ~~14/14/~~ 14 Sept. The MA stated that his wife had been thoroughly unfaithful to him both during the war and recently, of course. He wanted to get the child back (presently in Giessen with the wife) and to get a divorce, and to this end had written the wife to send the child to relatives in Koeln, who would see that the child was returned to the father. If the wife did not do this voluntarily, the MA hoped that CADROIT could help get the child back. If this were not possible, the MA would reveal to the Notaufnahmeverfahren her recent desertion (and possible thereby uncover the fact that she had been sent by C. to the CALCINO house), in order to secure withdrawal of recognition which has already been granted her. Hopefully, ~~throughout~~ the wife will be able to return the child without action by CADROIT. The case should be carefully watched to see that the transfer to the CALCINO house is not exposed by the irate MA.

4. [] informed C. that the former had learned of the case of an MA who had earlier (1952) ~~who had returned~~ returned to the DFR with copies of CADROIT, LCPAGAN, and TPOASIS material in his possession at the same time. Such cases should be avoided, of course. C. returned that LCPAGAN ~~material~~ material

material was normally made available to CADROIT visitors in the waiting room. The MA might have picked up a few copies for future distribution. No explanation could be found for the TPOASIS material, however. The point was stressed that CADROIT MA's should have no organizational connection with other resistance orgs, in which G. readily agreed.

5. [] requested full written report on the arrest during Aug. in the CADROIT offices of a DDR visitor who had been identified by some woman as having committed crimes in the East. Apparently the man had fled, hoping to sneak through the refugee screening. C.'s assistant had caused the arrest. C. was slightly familiar with the case, which had occurred during his vacation, but did not know all the details during this meeting.

6. [] stated that in line with current attempts to regularize ~~the situation~~ C.'s salary and other payments, an accurate estimate ^{monthly} would be necessary re the total/cost of maintenance of a car. C. does not yet have a car, [] realized. But an accurate estimate would be necessary before his overall income could be rationalized. C. to provide at the next meeting, if possible.

7. [] requested the file on MA H.S., and any other details pertinent to a possible turn-over to a new handler.

8. C. stated that he had discussed with Ladell the directive recently given C. by [] to the effect that all ~~persons~~ visitors with any knowledge of the SP^s be sent to the CALCINO house, specifically including Spitzelverpflichtete. Ladell had had reservations, and then discussed the matter with Henard, who ~~thereafter~~ thereafter discussed the matter with C. Both Henard and Ladell ~~had~~ said that sending persons over who did not appear to have real value (such as most Spitzelverpflichtete) would endanger CADROIT's valuable reputation as a ~~non~~ non-espionage organization. [] pressed to have C. send over as many persons as possible.
