Date, Place, and Time of Meeting: 21 Sept 54, 2000-2200, C.'s Apt.

Present: a. CARBOHYDRATE b. [ ]

1. CARBOHYDRATE delivered the following written reports:

a. Report on his interview with Dortha R., who had been sent to CADROIT by Krebs of SFB. R. claimed to have been a nurse in an SSD Leipzig "clinic", the function of which was to torture ~~prisoners~~ prisoners, kill them by means of poison, and dispose of them. The clinic was supposedly connected with the Maedler-Villa there. The purported use of opium came up frequently in her fantastic stories. She herself stated that she was ill and had often taken opium to kill the pain. Although some ~~names~~ names of officials in Leipzig seemed to be correct, <sup>(many addresses, etc. were wrong)</sup> the stories as a whole seemed to be clearly false. C. warned ~~SFB~~ <sup>Neue</sup> Zeitung, against imprudent use of the girl's stories. C. felt she was probably an opium addict, and clearly unbalanced. C. also informed Selchow of Abt. V.

b. Report on Harry B., who began visiting CADROIT from the East in Jan 54, stating that he had been forced to become an SFS ~~prisoner~~ Spitzel. Other CADROIT info later showed that he had given the SFS derogatory info concerning ~~many~~ a number of persons in his town in the DCR, leading to the arrest of at least one person in the East. After discussion with Madell, C. had informed Abt. V, pointing out that as yet there were no witnesses in West Berlin. Abt. V wanted to arrest the man anyway, and did so on his next visit. Abt. V was thereafter loath to give C. info as to what the status of the case was, but finally told C. that since important officials of Abt. V had been on vacation at the time of the arrest, B. had been let go due to an error on the part of ~~them~~ a lower Abt. V official. C. stressed verbally the point that CADROIT had not wanted to turn the man over to Abt. V, and that Abt. V had made a ~~mistake~~ <sup>mistake</sup> ~~by~~ <sup>by</sup> the time being there was

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little discussion of the possibility that Abt. V had not made a stupid error, but had really doubled or was attempting to double B. against the SFS.

c. Report on meeting with visitor from Gera who had been recruited by the SFS and been in contact with three SFS case officers. Visitor wanted advice as to what to do. C. tried to send him to the CALCINO house, but could not since it was after 1500, the time at which Frau K. leaves the house.

d. Report from MA giving info on a DDR family with two members working as SSD officials.

e. Report giving peripheral info on SSD office in Luebben.

f. Report by a refugee giving info on approx eight SSD officials and offices.

2. C. reported orally that:

a. CADROIT had no trace on Josef G.

b. There was no more to be learned re the recent Abt. V request for the file on Heins Zieckler aside from the facts that the police had expressed primary interest in Z.'s fiancée who was supposed to be working against the West (C. did not know precisely how or where the woman was located), and that so far as could be determined there had been no particular VFO connection in the matter. The police will not get the file, but will be given any pertinent info from it.

c. Most visitors whom C. deals with come between 1300 and 1700.

Since Frau K. in the CALCINO house leaves the office at 1500, a number of possibilities/are thus lost/ (COMMENT: Discussion with   showed this to be unavoidable—Frau K. had to leave at 1500 to carry out other duties.)

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3. [ ] and C. reviewed the status of the security forms. They have now been mimeographed in large numbers. C. doubted that he would be able to complete many of the forms by the end of Sept. [ ] made it clear that the forms are one of the most important items which have to be taken care of. ~~HERE~~ C. stated that he already has his time fully taken up (as well as that of Ohlsen) with interviewing visitors, attending meetings with ~~many~~ Referenten who have asked C. to attend due to a feeling that the interviewees may really be working for the East, and similar matters. C. stated that it would be hard to find time to complete the forms each month. [ ] said that the forms ~~many~~ are a priority matter, and will have to be completely filled out for August, even if it is not possible to get much on them done for September. <sup>If necessary, some other matters should be let go</sup> [ ] cut this part of the discussion of by stating that before discussing the matter further, C. should bring a copy of the forms to the next meeting for further discussion.

4. In reviewing the status of attempts to work out with the police a plan to cordon off the CADROIT offices on short order in the event of ~~unforeseen~~ trouble, C. reported that such a plan could be worked out with the police only through Sturz or Urban. [ ] would have to effect the liaison. It was agreed that C. would prepare a written plan along the lines which ~~many~~ were earlier discussed with [ ] After approval, [ ] could approach the police.

5. A review of the status of alarm systems within the CADROIT offices should that there are three ~~many~~ alarm <sup>buttons</sup> bells which ~~will~~ go directly to the ~~appropriate~~ police Praesidium. The <sup>buttons</sup> bells are located in the guard/doorman's area, the room where the night watchman stays between rounds, and the room where the approximately eight local black uniformed police stay between their rounds in the neighborhood. Use of any one of the <sup>alarm buttons</sup> bells will bring two <sup>police</sup> Volkswagen in approximately four minutes.

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6. [ ] gave C. four names to trace (Heinrich G., Johannes K., Adolph U., and Gerhard S.). C. stated that such a trace involves checking appropriate the five/CADROIT sets of files: MA cards, Schrift cards, Beu. cards, Belastende cards, and Besucher cards. This takes about 15 minutes of C's time, said C.

7. C. also noted that Hans Wolfgang Siemon had not appeared at CADROIT offices since he was requested on 15 Sept.

8. The next meeting was arranged for 24 Sept at 2000 at C's apt.

Addendum: Some time was spent in a discussion of C's library, which he stated he had been able to bring over from East Berlin without any loss. Discussion centered chiefly on American authors, which C. had seemed to have read rather thoroughly (Drieser, Hemingway, Faulkner and others which appear in the Soviet Zone). It appeared that C. reads the books he owns.

Addendum: [ ] also requested C's estimate of how much it would cost to maintain a car on a monthly basis (taxes, insurance, garage, gas, oil, repairs). C's estimate was approx 200 DM. This was discussed in some detail, with [ ] indicating that this figure seemed rather large.

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
