Date, Place, and Time of Meeting: 6 Oct 54, 2000-2300, CARBOHYDRATE's apt.

Persons present: a. CARBOHYDRATE b.

1. CARBOHYDRATE delivered:

a. A list of all CADROIT paid employees, as earlier requested. C stated the list was completely up to date. It was agreed that   would receive information concerning any changes which take place in the future. There are 80 persons listed. True names are given (and cover names, where they exist), addresses, and brief job description.

b. Completed part #1's form of the monthly security check sheet for 29 and 5, and a completed part #3 for the distribution mechanism. The room check, although earlier promised by C for the end of Sept, was not yet finished.   ~~stated~~ <sup>merely</sup> noted this, but did not needle very hard for the time being. Detailed discussion of the check sheets submitted was postponed for thorough study. To be taken up later with C.

c. Six arrest reports with available info. The arrestees were:

Hans Hallax, Julius Ernst, Paul Schuster, ~~Walter~~ Waltraud Lazak, Oskar ~~Wraener~~, and Georg Schrader. ~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~

A number took place some time ago (one in Sept 51). To be reported in monthly report. The reports were discussed in some detail, with C centering his remarks on whether or not there had been a failure on the part of the CADROIT.   made the point that Referenten should always, of course, ~~not~~ be appraising the MA with whom they work to see whether any of them have any strong "Draufgänger" tendencies; if so, it is better for CADROIT and the MA concerned that they part company. C noted that it was not always possible to work with completely perfect and all-wise MA.   readily agreed, noting that he did not propose a program of dropping a lot of MA, but was just repeating what every Referent already knew that it did nobody any good to work with an MA who does not take proper precautions. The very fact that the MA's

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security, in the last analysis, rested in his own hands and depended upon his own actions, meant that eyes must constantly be open to spot reckless or foolish MA. C agreed readily enough.

c. Four visitor and other reports concerning ~~xxxxxxxx~~ peripheral info re the SSD. To be turned over to BOB/CART.

d. A plan which, as earlier agreed, C would write for HENARD re cordoning off the office bldgs. in case of ~~xxxxxxxx~~ sudden trouble. [ ] had said that he did not think the matter should be raised with the police just now. For discussion with [ ] (C thinks the police would not agree to commit themselves to the plan due to lack of necessary ~~xxxx~~ patrol cars.)

e. Request for check of man who has rented a garage near the office bldg. [ ] has particulars).

f. A very interesting report on visit by a ~~xxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx~~ ~~xxxx~~ refugee to whom a friend in the Zone had given a plan of the Wunsdorf barracks. The source of the plan (in [ ]s possession) had offered to come to West Berlin and explain it (it now has just sketches of bldgs, without designation of nature, activities, etc.).

The source can be brought to West Berlin by a pre-arranged postcard. For discussion with BOB/CART.

g. Report on an SSD attempt to ~~xxxx~~ recruit a secretary, FrI. Kirchner. The secretary's mother, who lives in the DIER, had been brought to East Berlin in a car by three SSD officials who ordered her to visit her daughter and get the latter to come to East Berlin for a meeting with the SSD on 2 Oct. The mother was to state quite openly that the purpose was to recruit the daughter for the SSD; the daughter should consider the future before she refused, etc. The mother visited the daughter on 1 Oct, told the daughter the story. The daughter was [ ]

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instructed to have the mother report to the SSD that the daughter did not work for ~~the~~ CADROIT at all, but for Dr. Michel. In addition, the daughter would not think of working with such a notorious organization as the SSD.- any further attempts by the mother to recruit the daughter (so the mother was to report) would only alienate the daughter and mother~~from~~ from each other. On 5 Oct the daughter reported that all had gone according to plan: the mother had had to meet with the SSD on 2 and 3 Oct in East Berlin. The SSD had finally reacted by saying, "Well, if that is the situation, it seems that little can be done." On 3 Oct the SSD had attempted to have the mother send the ~~daughter~~ daughter a letter, but had dropped the idea when the mother insisted that it would do no good. Re the Dr. Michel story, had the SSD said, "Your daughter is lying to you. We know where she works." In leaving, the SSD officers had said, "Give our regards to your ~~daughter~~ daughter and have her give our regards to Herr Krebs and his cousin. Your daughter worked with him, alias H.     ". (NOTE: The SSD had earlier tried to recruit Krebs through his cousin who then lived in East Berlin, but has since fled to West ~~from~~ Berlin.) C takes the SSD remarks as evidence that the SSD does not know that the daughter now works for Froelich in Org. Abt, and stopped working for Krebs about six weeks ago. Note: The cousin of Krebs did not know the daughter, Frl. K. before the former's flight. The entire matter thus seems to be probably at an end, but C will report any further developments.

2. C suggested orally a check of the following man, re whom info had come to C from ~~some~~ Schwars, a CADROIT driver, who knows the following:

XXX Frans Szelenyi, an advisor and official of the Catholic National Welfare Council in West Berlin, Steinplatz, which is a welfare organization dealing with refugees. S. is scheduled to go to

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America in 1955, still possesses Hungarian citizenship, has some sort of connection with people in the East (in connection with his work, probably).

S. lives with a Hungarian girl named Maria, who used to be a cook for Clay and McCloy, but lost this job about a year ago due ~~to~~ apparently to her Hungarian citizenship. For namecheck.

3. C reported ~~in~~ in answer to queries that Ohlson is thoroughly cut in on the <sup>C</sup>CASTABIA arrangements ( that means Ohlson knows what C knows in this connection, and no more. Other Referenten, of course, have not been informed of the CASTABIA program).

4.  laid on the following arrangements:

a. C would include in future monthly reports written by him: Total of persons sent to CASTABIA house, with dates of each ~~transmission~~ transmission, b. total of persons C tried to send to CASTABIA, but would not go or could not go due to time of day or <sup>other</sup> ~~other~~ reasons, <sup>c.</sup> total of arrests reported during month, and <sup>d.</sup> some identification of each person reported as arrested. (NOTE: We get, of course, detailed individual arrest reports in any case.)

5. Next Meeting: 12 Oct, 2000, C's apt.

Addendum: C reported during this meeting that he had recently learned through Frau Voellborn that C had been condemned to death in absentia by a ~~xxxxxx~~ court in Potsdam for his role in the V. and Hermes operations. C was seen by the court as the chief malefactor in the situation. The father of V. had learned this information from ~~EMEX~~ Staatsanwältin Frau Krueger in Potsdam; the father told his wife, V's mother, who told ~~him~~ V's wife in West Berlin, who told C's wife. C remarked that his wife was a little anxious over the ~~xxxxxx~~ news and had shown a little fear. C felt this was a natural and temporary ~~xxxxxx~~ <sup>11-1</sup> <sub>1 2 E</sub>
