3. CARBO also delivered a report written by Berger re an approach made to him on 18 March by Werner JACOBS, Halle/Salle, Am Kirchtor 28a, for the SFS. Jacobs was arrested in October 1953 with a former CAIROIT MA, "Kohlmeier". It developed later that "Kohlmeier" was really an SFS Spitzel who had denounced Jacobs. ~~After 3 or 4 days Jacobs was released after having been forced to sign a Spitzelverpflichtung.~~ Jacobs telephoned Berger on 18 March and requested a meeting to be held shortly thereafter.

After reporting the telephone call, Berger met Jacobs, who stated that he had the SFS FBI of inviting Berger to a meeting in East Berlin at a time and place to be set by Berger. Berger's security and right to return to West Berlin were guaranteed. It would be possible, however, for Berger to stay in the East, where he would receive an apartment, position, civil rights, etc. The SFS gave Berger until 31 March to consider the matter; if he did not agree to come by then, the SFS would carry out the meeting "against Berger's will". The SFS could always be reached through Jacobs at his address in the DDR. This would be the last offer of the SFS to Berger. Berger refused the offer, but made a counter-offer: he would meet with SFS representatives, but in West Berlin, not East Berlin. Since the SFS would probably have two persons at such a meeting, Berger would be accompanied to the meeting. Safe-conduct would be assured the SFS representatives.

In conversations with Jacobs, the latter stated that he had also been earlier given the SFS FBI of learning the West German address of Rolf WICHMANN, who fled from the DDR in 1954, from the latter's mother in Halle. Jacobs stated that in a seven hour long discussion with the SFS during which he received the FBI of carrying a message to Berger, Jacobs had gotten the firm impression that the SFS did not have the CADROIT ~~staff~~ staff penetrated, but sets great weight upon effecting such a penetration. The SFS officer who dealt with Jacobs (identity unknown) stated, "It cannot go on with CADROIT as it has in the past, the group is prying around so much (stänkern) that we simply cannot allow it any longer. We have to do something, since ~~their~~ their work is really bothering us". When Berger queried Jacobs ~~re the meaning of this remark,~~ the latter replied that the present activity of CADROIT, its printed material and its radio broadcasts have unsettled the SFS, which has received orders from high levels to take more active measures. (COMMENT: It is not at all clear how Jacobs would know of such orders unless the SFS officer had mentioned them.)

Berger told Jacobs to inform the SFS that any further visits by the latter to Berger would result in Jacobs' arrest as an SFS Spitzel.

4. CARBO reported that he had checked the possible means of contacting Vogel and had discussed ~~the idea of~~ the idea of ~~having a message sent to her.~~ having a message sent to her. All were agreed to such a plan. 5. CARBO reported orally:

X a. ~~Herr~~ KAISER, the photographer, is to be let go with three months pay. ~~He~~ was seen as a potential security weak spot, being chronically unable to stay out of debt. ~~He~~ ~~has~~ ~~been~~ ~~forced~~ ~~to~~ ~~pay~~ ~~some~~ ~~of~~ ~~his~~ ~~debts~~ ~~recently~~. ~~He~~ ~~may~~ ~~possibly~~ ~~start~~ ~~some~~ ~~sort~~ ~~of~~ ~~action~~ ~~in~~ ~~the~~ ~~labor~~ ~~court~~, being 60% disabled.

b. The mother of Reibel, who was approached recently by the SFS, is now in West Berlin where she will stay. One more close relative of a staffer has thus been gotten out of the BDR.

X c. A visitor informed CADROIT that he had overheard a conversation in a restaurant near Titania Palast (having developed a fine sense of hearing during five years in the Bautzen EZ) to the following effect: Two persons speaking with Saxon dialects gave to a third man who appeared to speak a Berlin dialect the FBI of learning the habits of Jutta von WILLICH, who is a secretary in the Org. Abt. ERNEST CARBO noted the probability that the SFS was preparing some sort of approach to von WILLICH. In answer to queries, he stated that she is fairly new in the Org. Abt, having been preceded by Fri Kirschner, who was formerly approached by the SFS (through a ~~mother~~, as FBI recalls). von WILLICH does not ~~have~~ learn much sensitive info in her work, which concerns mostly quite ordinary DDR addresses for mail propaganda. CARBO felt she ~~is~~ tends to talk a little too much to take part in a good play back attempt. Unmarried and about 35.

d. From the info reported above re Berger and Willich, as well as other indications, it seemed to CARBO that the SFS had picked up its activity against CADROIT somewhat.

e. Ohlbrecht of the RR division, who has direct contact with "HICOG" (really MID, unknown to CARBO) has been told by his American contact that he must be very careful. Ohlbrecht is a very important man with excellent contact with RR affairs, etc., and is therefore a prime target for the SFS—he should not have night meetings with HA which require him to go home late at night alone, etc. The result has been to increase Ohlbrecht's already noticeable nervousness and his requests to CARBO and LADELL to increase his personal security by providing a car, etc. The recent Schwarnicks case as thrown him into a tizzy. Would it not be possible to have HICOG stop needing Ohlbrecht? [] agreed to look into the matter, ~~but~~ ~~it~~ ~~is~~ ~~not~~ ~~usually~~ ~~possible~~, since CADROIT has now only two drivers. One more would allow night driver service to take Ohlbrecht and others home after late meetings. ~~No~~ ~~definite~~ ~~agreements~~ ~~came~~ ~~from~~ ~~this~~ ~~latter~~ ~~discussion~~, however. Harrison may wish to bring matter up with Ladell ~~at~~ ~~some~~ ~~opportunity~~.

f. During the above discussion, CARBO listed the following three staffers as the only ones who seem to show more than average nervousness: Wd f, Ohlbrecht,

and Seelits (who is blind).

g. Some lower level grunting had been heard recently from the four staffers who have to stand late duty (1700-1930 every day for a period of a week at a time), but get no extra pay for this duty. The requirement is seen as unfair by the men involved, but Ladell is reluctant to allow any more money for the service, claiming budget difficulties. CARBO painted the matter up as a morale situation with which Ladell might not be completely familiar, and suggested that a small payment of 5-10 DM per month to the staffers involved might go far to remove feelings of unfair treatment. Also discussed possibility that a permanent man for this service might be the best solution. The four persons presently required to stand late duty are: Schmidt (very angry), Horn, Schadow, Pesch, Ohlson, and Haynes. No commitments made in this respect, but Harrison may wish to keep his ears tuned to this subject when with LADELL.

h. CARBO noted an increase both in numbers of general visitors and in numbers of spitzelverpflichtete DDR visitors. Jan saw a drop in visitor totals, so far this month, however, there have been 33 spitzelverpflichtete etc (a relatively high figure).

i. Re the Lengner/ police report, CARBO had seen Klarichs, who will try to get a copy of the report. The latter will have to see Weisemann.

j. Re a question previously asked in connection with Peter Mothes (former MA now in West Germany), Mothes was the photographer. (The report received by BOB and credited to ODUNIT had stated that a member of Mothes group had been a photographer—apparently someone this detail of the story has been confused by someone).

6. [] instructed CARBO to submit CARBOIT contact reports (Besuchervermerk) re visitors who appear to be of interest to CALTABIA (whether visitors actually arrived at CALGIMO or not) on a current basis rather than on a monthly basis as at present. These reports, which contain reasons why any persons were of possible interest were or could not be sent to CALGIMO, have been obtained for many months. It was agreed that they would now be submitted upon a weekly basis.

7. [] stated that he was interested in assembling all known info re Abt. 5 of the SFS, the Abt. charged with responsibility for combatting the activities of the West Berlin resistance groups (most of the CADRAIN groups are included in its SPI's). To this end, he wanted to reproduce CARBO's SFS files. CARBO readily agreed to deliver all files for reproduction, but noted that [] had previously reproduced all SFS file information. [] limited the requirement to all files for the last two years (for the present, at least). CARBO noted that he has very little personal info for Abt. 5 in Normannstr. Abt. 5 has sections in almost every SFS installation, of course, and often coordinates with Abt 2 (Espionage) in appropriate cases. In referring to the fact that Hochwald had originally set up the files, [] queried as to what penetrations, if any Hochwald had had of the SFS. CARBO replied that Hochwald had not had too much; he did have one person in Weissenhof (f), who had come to West Berlin, been advised to stay here by Hochwald, returned to the East Sector anyway, and was arrested. (This was before CARBO's time, of course.). Any info re this penetration from any reader would

be appreciated.

8. CARBO noted that good personality info re the schwarin and Magdeburg SFS installations was available. The latter supposedly came from a defected and fled S S Oberfeldwebel named Herbert SCHOSSEE from Magdeburg, who has been in the custody of various IS's, including Abt. 5 from whom CARBO heard of the case. ~~Could Pepin get any of this Magdeburg info and secure its release to CARBO.~~ Pepin promised nothing except that he would try. CART to be alerted re SCHOSSEE, who came from Abt. 2 of the SFS.

9. [] queried re Herbert BURKHARDT, DOB 29 Jan 27, noted in the CADROIT monthly for Jan as having been dropped in due to "possible SFS connections". CARBO recalled the case. B. had been a Spitzel for the SFS, had denounced people in Schmalkalden to the SFS, had fled to West Germany. The case was still active with CADROIT, which was trying to find some way to convict him. B may be tried. The CE potential seemed to be very marginal. CARBO instructed to produce the file, however.

10. [] instructed CARBO to retrace Rosemarie and Gertrud WEIZEL, who had previously been traced in the visitor and derog files with negative result. Pepin had learned that a CADROIT staffer had requested Rosemarie to appear on approx 4 March (which had probably not yet gotten in the file—CADROIT has its bureaucracy also). For []

11. [] raised a subject for thought by CARBO—we would not try to solve it now due to the lateness of the hour. The subject was the possible abolishment of the MA waiting room (a procedure which segregates the MA for the far more numerous than ordinary visitors and may thereby pinpoint them at least by physical description for SFS Spitzels). A brief discussion showed that there are many arguments pro and con, with CARBO drawing up a rough floor plan to show that no one in the line leading to the porter or in the visitor waiting room (where any Spitzels would in all probability be) could see the point where a MA would drop out of the flow of bodies and go to the MA waiting room. A person sitting in the visitor waiting room, however, might have to remain there for as much as an hour due to overload of staffers, during which time he might be recognized by an SFS Spitzel. The matter was let go at this point, however, without raising the question what a Spitzel who succeeds in getting himself registered as an MA may learn through the present arrangement. This matter will be raised again.
