

The President has requested me to invite you to a ceremony at the White House commemorating the issuance of the "Atoms For Peace" stamp.


The President, the Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, and the Postmaster General will take part in this ceremony on the lawn adjacent to the President's office starting at 9:30 o'clock Thursday morning, July 28, 1955.

It is the intention of the Post Office Department to present albums of "Atoms For Peace" stamps to the President, the Secretary General of the United Nations, the Secretary of State, the United States Representative to the United Nations, the Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, and the Director, United States Information Agency. Albums will also be delivered to representatives of the eighty-four countries invited to the United Nations international conference on the peaceful uses of atomic energy to be held next month in Geneva, Switzerland.
