Subj: Merchant Shipping in the Port of Amoy, China

1. At the IAC meeting on 19 February 1958 the subject of merchant shipping into the port of Amoy arose during a discussion of sensitive situations in the Far East. This letter is in response to your request for information on this subject.
2. Because of the proximity of Amoy to Chinese Nationalist shore batteries on Quenoy, the port has been generally avoided by merchant ships. ONI records show that for the fifteen month period between June 1956 and August 1957 there was a total of only six arrivals at Amoy. These arrivals were made by two British ships, the WHITE BEE (1288 GRT) and the KING BEE (1089 GRT). Both were fired on by the Nationalists on several occasions.
3. Since the last firing incident in July 1957, the Chinese Nationalists have adopted a policy of not molesting foreign ships entering and leaving Amoy, resulting in a marked increase in traffic. Three British ships (ROZELLE BREEZE, TWEED BREEZE, and YARRA BREEZE, owned by John Manners and Company, Ltd., Hong Kong) now operate regular, but unscheduled runs between Hong Kong and Amoy. During November 1957 these ships made a total of four arrivals and in December a total of five arrivals. However, only one ship is known to have called in January and one in February. The three British ships are the only non-Communist ships using the port. The Chinese Communists opened the port to the Japanese on 15 February but no Japanese ships have yet arrived. No Soviet or European satellite ships have called at Amoy during the past several years.
4. Nationalist shore batteries have prevented Chinese Communist ships of any size from using Amoy; only a few small wooden ships and junks have been calling at the port.
5. Cargo information is limited but imports seem to be primarily fertilizer, foodstuffs, and small quantities of steel and other general cargo via junks; the only exports known are soft-wood and bamboo from the Yingtan area inland, and canned foods.
6. British-flag ships operating from Hong Kong should be able to handle the current limited seaborne commerce needs of Amoy as long as the Nationalists allow them to enter unmolested. For this reason it is unlikely that the Chinese Communists will attempt to increase the number of their own ships using the port and in so doing subject this shipping to Nationalist gunfire.



7. In summary, the amount of shipping using the port of Amoy is relatively insignificant. However, even the small amount engaged in this trade is a continuous potential source of friction because of the concentration of Nationalist and Communist military forces facing each other in close proximity to the port and its approaches.
