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4. Matt Baird reports on comments by two speakers--Bob Kennedy and Harriman--at the National Interdepartmental Seminar last week. The Attorney General was asked by a student why the Peace Corps was not involved in the counterinsurgency effort. In reply, the AG mentioned that "The Invisible Government" claims the Peace Corps is controlled by CIA. Matt says the Attorney General's comments left those in the know with the impression that the allegation was false but that the AG did not put it as hard as he could have.



In the course of his remarks to the students, Harriman abruptly stopped in mid-stream at one point and said he has become irritated with all of the adverse publicity which has been given to CIA. He said he was grateful for the existence of the Agency and its work which unfortunately could not be publicized. ✓
