

None of the six Soviet ships previously reported enroute Cuba have according to latest information. turned back. Two of the Satellite ships reported enroute are now in Cuban waters and the third, the Czech Kladno, appears to be still enroute.

BRITISH WORLD - Responsible Foreign Office officials now feel that Khrushchev has demonstrated in Cuba a willingness they had not previously suspected to take much greater military risks in advancing his political objectives. In their view, the Soviet missile buildup in Cuba was geared to Khrushchev's intention to provoke a Berlin showdown later this year. However, Khrushchev may not have anticipated the vigorous US response, and this probably accounts for the signs of indecision in Moscow since last Monday. A Foreign Office assessment that the Soviet decision to send missiles to Cuba reflected concern over the imbalance in the strategic situation and a desire to redress this quickly and relatively cheaply [redacted] [redacted]


[redacted] Foreign Secretary Lord Home is reported by the press today to have told the Soviet chargé that Britain considers Moscow responsible for the present dangerous situation, and after the buildup in Cuba is halted, London wants the missile bases promptly dismantled. Khrushchev's offer to swap bases is reported ^{in the press} to have been received with intense interest in diplomatic quarters in London, ~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ and the message is said to have been seen as bringing the Cuban crisis into the bargaining stage.
