MR. DULLES: .

a. Reported on a very friendly conversation he had with Congressman Cannon on 23 December. He stated that he did not get into specific budget figures with Congressman Cannon but merely discussed briefly certain world events and exchanged pleasantries. The DCI indicated to Cannon that he would be ready to appear before his subcommittee for a thorough discussion of Agency activities and budgetary problems as soon as Cannon was ready to receive him.

b. Referred to a question which had come up as to whether or not we should appear with the State Department in their hearing before Congressman Rooney's committee because of the inclusion in State's agenda of an item covering the National Intelligence Survey program. The DCI expressed the view that we should not appear in any such hearing but should, if State requested it, supply State with a written memorandum which they could utilize in the course of the hearing.

c. Noted an exchange of cables between Headquarters and [redacted] dealing with an apparent conflict or misunderstanding between the service attache and our Chief of Station [redacted]. He asked [redacted] to see that [redacted] was kept advised of developments in this situation in the event it seemed necessary to have [redacted] step into a possible coordinating problem between CIA and the Department of Defense.



e. Noted a State Department telegram from Moscow concerning reports that Nehru had been complaining to the Soviets about delays


in the Soviet construction of the Indian steel mill. He requested Mr. [redacted] to query [redacted] and see if [redacted] had any additional information which would confirm Indian Government dissatisfaction with Soviet performance under their contract.
