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

DEPUTIES' MEETING

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MR. DULLES:



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d. Noted he had received a memorandum from Colonel Grogan, in which he concurred, recommending that in the future when an Agency employee plans to make a speech as a representative of CIA, such speech be furnished Colonel Grogan in sufficient time to obtain clearance from State and other departments as necessary.

e. Noted he was concerned about whose responsibility it is to provide protection for the President during trips abroad. He said wartime trips made by Presidents had been no problem since they were fully protected by the Armed Forces. He commented he had been considering sending a letter to Mr. U. E. Baughman, Chief of the Secret Service, pointing out that CIA stands ready to lend support to the agency who has responsibility for protection of the President when traveling in foreign areas. The Director commented he had discussed this matter at some length with Mr. Baughman last night and had told Baughman

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that we would be glad to make [redacted] available to accompany the President's party for the purpose of acting as liaison between the party and our Chiefs of Station at the places to be visited. At the present time [redacted] is only scheduled to be in [redacted]. The Director also said he would like an analysis from Mr. Houston of any laws or assigned responsibilities for the protection of the President. Mr. Houston will also draft the above-mentioned letter to Mr. Baughman for the Director's consideration.

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f. In connection with the President's trip the Director commented that there are a number of sensitive items which possibly may come to the President's attention; for example, [redacted]

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[redacted] He therefore said he was considering briefing General Goodpaster and Major John Eisenhower on these items in order that the President would not get caught short in the event they come up during his trip. Action: DD/P to prepare a memorandum covering the above activities and any others in the same category for the Director's approval for subsequent presentation to General Goodpaster and Major Eisenhower.

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g. Noted he was concerned over the fact that he had been advised earlier this week that the FBI had concurred in the surfacing of [redacted] and had been informed yesterday that Mr. Hoover did not concur in making this [redacted] available to the HCUA. The Director said based on the original information, he had called Dick ^{Aarons} ~~Aarons~~ of the Committee and advised him that [redacted]

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would be made available to appear before the HCUA. He said he saw no alternative but to advise Mr. ^{Aarons} ~~Aarons~~ that the FBI had run into some problems on this particular case and therefore had to reverse its decision. Action: [redacted] to get in touch with Mr. Houston and recommend to the Director how this matter can best be handled. Note: It was the Director's thought that in advising ^{Aarons} ~~Aarons~~ of the FBI's reversal it should also be indicated that this Agency was rather lukewarm in the first instance and would prefer to delay [redacted] appearance to a later date.

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h. Referred to discussions now being held with the Assistant Chief of Staff, Intelligence, Department of the Army, regarding DCID's 5/1, [redacted] and in particular the stand taken by General Willems that these directives, if approved, will prevent any activity

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by the Army in the clandestine field in view of the clause requiring coordination of such activities with the DCI prior to being carried out. The Director noted that there are a great number of coordinated operations with the Army now being carried out and he desired a list in order that he could show it to the Secretary of Defense at such time as Mr. McElroy desires to discuss this problem.
