

viewed briefly [redacted] credentials and are in

his apparent fundamental grounding in internal medicine and  
psychiatry.

More specifically I discussed with [redacted] the  
possibility of finding a young psychiatrist who has just com-  
pleted his formal training who might fill the T.O. vacancy in  
your Medical Office. [redacted] felt that the position might be  
of interest to a young psychiatrist, especially if service  
with the C.I.A. for two or three years could be considered the  
equivalent of service with the armed forces. He will keep his
