Dear John:

I had to let myself cool off a few days after reading Doris Fleeson's comment about your appointment before telling you what I think about it. She is an able writer with a needle-sharp pen, but it is not without significance that she gratuitously attacks a man in your position. You have accepted the call of the President to serve at a most critical post in a grim period and apparently with the hallmark of disqualification, in her opinion, that you came from the business and industrial community and you have made a success.

I wonder why she has not seen fit to comment upon the recurring work stoppages at Cape Canaveral and Vandenberg Air Force Base, the loss of over 50,000 man hours in one year, and the exaction by the unions at those installations of wages all out of proportion to that which is paid for comparable work elsewhere in the country; and all of this at a time when we are trying to catch up and pass the Russians in a life and death race.

My only advice is, don't let Doris Fleesons get under your skin as one apparently got under mine.
