SUBJECT: Charles Simone Emil Montial

1. Reference is made to my previous memorandum of 16 June 1960 concerning the above named subject.

2. On 13 July Mr. Montial called and asked if he could come in to see me again prior to his departure for France on July 15th. I informed him that I had explored the possibilities of our utilizing his services, but that it did not appear that we would be able to take advantage of his kind offer at the present time. I suggested that he merely let me know where he might be contacted should in case it might be felt that there was anything he could do for us. He stated that he had a bit of information he wanted to pass on to us, and, also, he had addresses he wanted to give us where he might be contacted and would, therefore, like a personal interview. I agreed to see him in response to this request and talked to him for about thirty minutes on July 13.

3. Mr. Montial advised that he was sailing from New York on the Liberte on July 15th and that he was proceeding to Paris and from there to Lyon where his wife resides. He stated that since it had developed that he could not get his American citizenship for another two, three, or four months due to procedural delays, he had obtained a French passport from the French Consulate here in Washington. He showed me this passport which bore the number "54." He also showed me a U.S. re-entry permit valid until July 1961 and stated that he would plan to return to the U.S. some time prior to that date in order to obtain his final U.S. citizenship papers. Mr. Montial further advised that, after a short stay in Lyon, he planned to go to Algiers where he has been offered a position by a Monsieur Foulat whom I judge is an electrical contractor. Montial stated that he has known Foulat for a number of years and that Foulat has done a great deal of electrical work around U.S. air bases in France, principally the installation of landing lights and other heavy duty electrical equipment. According to Montial, Foulat, about nine months ago, opened a branch of his business in Algiers, at which time he purchased in France a truck, bulldozer, and other equipment which he has shipped to Algiers. Montial stated that Foulat paid cash for all of this equipment and that he has appeared to be a highly affluent businessman for the past seven or eight years, although

Thank you very much for your letter of 30 June concerning the photograph in the 1960 Yearbook of the American Peoples Encyclopedia.


