AN OPEN LETTER TO AMERICANS WHO MAY WONDER WHY KRUSHCHOV'S HERE  
WHY SHOULD KRUSHCHOV NOT WANT NIXON TO BE OUR NEXT PRESIDENT ?

Now that Tito, tight-rope walker, tyrant, torturer and murderous dictator of Communist enslaved Yugoslavia, seemingly afraid of being left out of the lime-light if absent, and probably hoping while here to get additional support from the Eisenhower-Nixon Administration, is personally leading his delegation at the present U.N. General Assembly session, Krushchov surely can be happy.

Krushchov, Butcher of the Ukraine, has set-up this first meeting in the free world of top gangsters from all Communist enslaved nations, but China. That, and our State Department's limitation of his movements to Manhattan, while classifying Tito, an equally loyal and ardent Communist, as a "neutral", free to travel and visit his agents throughout our land, must make Krushchov laugh!

For 41 years I've mixed with various Slavic peoples, first as a U.S. Army Courier in Eastern Europe in 1919; then in the Caucasus for a New York firm in 1920 and early 1921; later operating (1921-1941) my own company in the former Kingdom of Yugoslavia; finally, helping refugees, here and in other lands, in their resettlement problems.

Because of that experience, gained directly with people of all classes, faiths and kinds, and not superficially by talking through interpreters during short stops on hurried high-level trips, or by sitting cozily in diplomatic discussions while losing the "cold war", I agree with the better informed observers that Krushchov wants to use the United Nations stage for world propaganda purposes, and to come closer to the delegations from the new African nations, and from the Asian and Latin American states, for voting control in the U.N.

However, in my opinion, Krushchov has another aim in setting-up his present U.N. Communist "round-up", which is to help elect Richard Nixon to be the next President of our United States. Krushchov, no fool, knows that if enough anxiety and trouble be stirred up to force the Eisenhower-Nixon Administration to react, to appear to be "standing up against Krushchov", then many Americans will vote for Nixon, just "to show Krushchov where to get off". That, to my view, is just what Krushchov wants, and here's why I think so:-

Krushchov must feel that the Eisenhower-Nixon Administration's foreign policies, because of such actions as those cited below, have given eight fruitful years to International Communism:-

1. Its failure to act on the Hungarian revolt in 1956. Moscow waited some days, then seeing our "do nothing" policy, sent in its tanks and smashed the revolt. Tito, who then had a Mission in Washington, asking for help, waited 12 days, then, November 4th, the day after our Administration saved him by selling (really giving) him \$98,300,000 of good commodities for Yugoslav dinars, announced his approval of Moscow's interference in free Hungary.
2. Its invitation to Krushchov to visit the United States in 1959.

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3. Its poor handling of affairs with, and apparent indifference to Communist penetration into, Latin America.
4. Its steady support of Communist Poland and Yugoslavia has aided Moscow, easing Moscow's load in supporting the Communist Block. It enabled Tito, posing as a "national" Communist, to finance his pompous Near, Middle and Far Eastern, and African trips, his costly Missions to Asian, African and Latin American lands, to spread the virus of Communism; to give credits to under-developed countries; and lavishly to entertain the constantly arriving delegations from nations on Communism's schedule of conquest.

Our present troubles in Cuba and Latin America are tied closely to Tito's 7-man so-called, "Mission of Good Will", which June 25 to August 22, 1950, visited Mexico, Costa Rica, Honduras, Cuba, Haiti, Venezuela, Columbia, Ecuador, Peru, Bolivia, Brazil, and The Argentine. Supposedly a trade and cultural relations Mission, the activities and speeches of its members showed clearly that wooing of Latin American nations to vote with the Soviet Block in the U.N. was its main aim. Strangely, almost not one word of this Mission and its work appeared in our press !

5. Douglas Dillon, our Under Secretary of State, reportedly called anti-Communist Dictator, Trujillo, a "tyrant, torturer and murderer", when we broke diplomatic relations with him. But this July, in Yugoslavia, Dillon with his wife and daughter visited Communist Dictator, Tito, certainly a far greater "tyrant, torturer and murderer", at Tito's island retreat of Brioni. On leaving Yugoslavia Mr. Dillon expressed satisfaction with Communist Yugoslavia's use of our aid, and inferred our support for Tito regarding a loan of \$300,000,000 cash, hoped for from the International Monetary Fund and Western Nations.... our share to be at least \$150,000,000.
6. Our Administration's treating Tito as a "neutral", has facilitated his work for World Communism, work against us, made possible by our support. His and his aides' speeches in Yugoslavia prove the stupidity of this treatment. If, as some suggest, Tito be invited to Washington, and used in any way in our handling of new nations, then why do we have a Foreign Service ? Have we no policies ?

Krushchov knows all this and much, much more. He and Tito, "smart cookies", blow hot or cold at each other as needed to milk us for more dollars through the Eisenhower-Nixon Administration, to enable Tito and his bankrupt government to carry on, doing their part with the rest of the Communist Block towards the overthrow of our United States, the free world's last bastion.

Can't you see Krushchov chuckling as he thinks of all this, and saying to himself, "The Eisenhower-Nixon foreign policies have been wonderful for us, for International Communism. Nixon keeps saying he approves of them. So why raise a change ? Let's stir up trouble for that Administration at the United Nations, make us look opposed to them, and help get Nixon elected President. He's so naive he says he knows and understands me. He's my boy. Let's go ! "

Isn't it time we wake up ! Let's look after our own people first.
