
I have dedicated myself to this purpose. In doing so, I have in no manner accomplished other than establishing trust in myself as a business man, and I find frankly ——— that is all most of the foreign business firms want. TRUST.

I received a letter this morning from Germany that I feel should be called to your attention. Frankly, I do not know what to think of it ———but after giving it every consideration ———and studying the intent ———it could be very important. I particularly call attention to the fact that certain persons hesitate to TRUST all information to our forces over there.

I can vouch for the writer of this letter only to the extent that we have been doing business for about 18 months and have constant touch with each other. So far —it has been strictly business. However, I have purposely sent music (sheet) etc. to the children of the writer and have been happy to learn that they are teaching this in the schools. In sickness, I have offered professional advice ———I have written to them about GAD. It seems they are hungry for our views on this subject also. It has been these little things that has made it possible for them to regard our firm very highly and offer us first choice on new business of new products.

I also know that the writer is highly intelligent in many fields, and know from his previous letters that he hates the Russians very very much. He lost an arm at Moscow and was the last survivor of his outfit, and walked 8 miles to the German lines after losing his arm, and seemingly the Russians decided to let him die slowly so let him walk. That is from what I have heard from him.
