SUBJECT: International Diplomatic Communications
(Proposed Legislation to Permit Reciprocal Radio Agreements)

REFERENCE: Memorandum for Addressees from the Special Assistant
to the President for National Security Affairs,
same subject, dated May 29, 1957. SIC 9-3731

You will recall that, as outlined in subparagraph a of the reference memorandum, the President requested a report by the Director of Central Intelligence and the Chairman, Interdepartmental Intelligence Conference, as to the balance of advantages and disadvantages from the viewpoint of intelligence which would result if proposed legislation on the subject were approved.

By memorandum dated June 17, 1957, the Director of Central Intelligence advised that CIA and IIC have not as yet been able to reach agreement on the requested report, and the Director of Central Intelligence recommended that action with respect to the subject be deferred pending more exhaustive investigation in the ensuing months with a view to submitting a recommendation prior to the convening of the Congress in 1958.

In the light of the foregoing further action will not be taken by this office with respect to the subject until such time as the report requested by the President is submitted for appropriate consideration.

Radio Operating Agreements)

REFERENCES: Memo for: The Under Secretary of State,
The Deputy Secretary of Defense, The
Director of CIA, The Chairman, Interdepartmental
Intelligence Conference, same subject,
dated 29 May 1957.

1. The reference calls for a report by me and by the Chairman, Interdepartmental Intelligence Conference as to the balance of advantages and disadvantages from the viewpoint of intelligence which would result if subject legislation were approved.

2. My representatives and representatives of the Chairman, IIC, have discussed this matter and have not as yet been able to reach agreement. Not only intelligence is involved, but also the matter of internal security, and there are a number of factors which require further detailed consideration, including certain new developments in the field of radio communication.

3. In view of the foregoing and also the improbability that the Congress in the short time remaining in this session would have an opportunity to deal with this matter, I recommend that action be deferred pending more exhaustive investigation in the ensuing months with a view to submitting a recommendation prior to the convening of the Congress in 1958.
