SUBJECT: Briefing by the DCI of the House Committee on Science and Astronautics - 24 February 1959

1. The Director briefed the House Committee on Science and Astronautics beginning at ten o'clock for approximately an hour and a half. Other Agency representatives remained until 12:15. Present for the Committee were:



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No transcript was taken of the hearing which was in Room 356 of the Old House Office Building. A technical sweep was done on the room just prior to the hearing.

2. The Director worked from briefing notes which covered a brief review of the national intelligence machinery and USIB. The Director discussed briefly Soviet science and technology and then went into the Soviet ballistic missile program. There were many questions. Subsequently, Dr. Scoville briefed on the Soviet space program and in answer to a question covered the Soviet aircraft defenses around Moscow.

3. Mr. Anfuso said a few words about the Director's experience in the intelligence field indicating to the Committee that Mr. Dulles' great experience should lend weight to his words.

4. Mr. McCormack was most pleasant with the Director and reminded him of his coming luncheon date. Mr. McCormack queried whether the Agency was receiving intelligence from all sources in the Government and reminded the group that he was a member of the Committee that approved the legislation establishing CIA and he wished to be sure that their concept was being carried forward, i. e., that CIA would be the heart of the intelligence structure. Mr. McCormack also asked a question relating to the attrition rate of CIA agents. (We will not follow up on this specifically but we will have figures available relating to agent deaths and missing cases previously requested by Mr. Sheppard. These will be used at the coming luncheon on 6 March.)



6. The Director commented on Representative Daddario in OSS, a portion of which was under the Director's supervision. Prior to the DCI's departure, Mr. Daddario lauded the Director's efforts and experience in the intelligence field. Daddario specifically commented on the economic threat of Soviet Russia. In talking with Mr. Daddario after the hearing, he seemed much interested in the Agency and OSS alumni. I suggested he might wish to visit at the Agency in the future to learn more of the Agency's functions and responsibilities. He very much wished to do so and luncheon arrangements will be made. (The Director is aware of this and approves.)

7. Mr. Fulton mentioned his visit on the Soviet oceanographic vessel presumably when it was docked at San Francisco. Dr. Scoville had considerable information on this particular vessel. Mr. Fulton stated that he personally did not believe this type of activity should be permitted.

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[redacted] telephoned in connection with the [redacted] case. He advised that it is expected that the first article will appear approximately the 11th of March. Any arrangements with the Congressional committees would be for executive session with release of testimony no earlier than 9 March.
