


Dear Mr. Dulles:

Dear Mr. Postmaster General:

The recently instituted "Champion of Liberty" series of four and eight cent stamps is a magnificent way of telling the people of the world that America stands for liberty. May I suggest a name for inclusion in this effective series for 1960?

I would like to nominate my father, Leo Tolstoy, for commemoration during 1960, as November 20, 1960 will mark the fiftieth anniversary of his death.

The figure of Leo Tolstoy has represented the essence of liberty initially to the myriad peoples of Russia and later to all humanity. Throughout his life and reflected in his writings he has shown that he could not compromise with any intentional dilution of liberty, and though this has been clearly recognized, the Soviets have tried and are still trying to pervert Leo Tolstoy's teaching and have tried unsuccessfully to make him a prophet of their choosing and propaganda.

But as you know, Leo Tolstoy's novels, as well as his articles, always stood for liberty, love to mankind and for human rights. As he wrote in his essays, such as "The Law of Violence" and "The Law of Love", his famous article, "I Cannot Remain Silent", his letters to Czar Nicholas II, he was unable to choose the easy course of silence when injustice demanded to be exposed.

It would, dear Mr. Postmaster General, make a tremendous impression upon the liberty loving peoples of the world if Leo Tolstoy could appear in 1960 in the magnificent "Champion of Liberty" series.
