You wrote me on September 23, after I had made a futile attempt to see you, and suggested I could put in a memorandum observations on my trip abroad.

However, I did not feel that I could satisfactorily put in writing what worries me about the German situation, which progressively threatens to slip out of our control within the next few years. I have certain ideas of what could be done to counteract this erosion of our position there, but would like to discuss them with you at your convenience.

I shall be in Washington from Monday, January 2 through Saturday, January 7, and shall stay at the Cosmos Club. If you could give me an appointment during that period at any time, it would be helpful in arranging my calendar for the days in Washington.



Dear Mr. Jules :

Our mutual good friend John L. Simpson conveyed to me your very kind personal regards and your invitation to see you when I should come to Washington. He reached me just a few hours before Mrs. Brandt and I left for Berlin where I shall teach as a visiting exchange professor during the winter semester.

First of all I want to thank you for your kindness of having remembered me. But I also want to say that when I found out that I could spare a day before taking off for London by air (Mrs. Brandt went by boat) I went Tuesday night to Washington - to take the chance of perhaps being able to see you even if only for a few minutes. I called your office and talked to your secretary. Unfortunately you were so busy all day long that the lady refused even to give you the message that I came to Washington to see you.

I called at 10 AM, at 12 and at 5 PM, but the secretary Mrs. Custan was still down.

I shall return by mid-March and will then write you beforehand to find out whether you may have a few minutes for me. If in the meantime there is anything you want me to do I am at your disposal.

Unfortunately my observations on the major cause of the resistance against EDE which I mentioned when I saw you last have been proven correct.
