

Dear Shapiro:

I had got a considerable way in investigating the houseboat and other possibilities and arrangements when unfortunately the political trouble struck out here for the first time. There is now a state of emergency declared. It is therefore not practicable to plan very much for the moment. For instance, all vessels are liable to requisitions, movement of non-official persons restricted, and the general atmosphere uncertain. Moreover, I myself, having had a good deal of experience in jungle warfare, etc. naturally am exceptionally busy both trying to do my own work and the emergency work.

If the position continues as at present, it is not unpleasantly serious. But at the same time I do not think that any responsible government officer would welcome a visit of the character previously proposed - and when you wrote the proposal seemed an excellent one. It is to be hoped that the situation will much improve. But this is always somewhat doubtful owing to the way in which these things work.

Under these circumstances I really think that I must recommend that the plan is postponed for the time being.

What, in any case, are your own views on this subject? Would you please write to me about it. I don't want you to think that I am being unhelpful or obstructive, but it looks to me as if individual travel to the upriver points (the only ones of interest) is liable to be severely limited for some considerable time ahead.
