Dear General Smith:

In response to your letter of February 4, and pursuant to our telephone conversation on the same day, I have been working for the past month on an extension of [redacted] leave from the University of California for another year. The task you committed to me was not an easy one, since the Department [redacted] is very much in need of [redacted] services, but I cannot but be impressed by your statement "that [redacted] can give no more essential service to his government than in his present capacity, and we simply cannot spare him for another year."

Therefore, I am prepared to recommend to The Regents that [redacted] I would be greatly aided in securing approval for this recommendation if you would send me by return mail a letter stating that it is your understanding and agreement that this is to be the last leave granted to [redacted] and no further plea for his services in the Central Intelligence Agency will be made.

Dear Dr. Sproul:

As I told you today on the telephone, I am forced by circumstances to urge as strongly as I know how to do it the extension of [redacted] leave for another year.

He is rendering such outstanding and, indeed, indispensable service to this Agency that this request should be considered as in the vital interests of the national security. I realize the difficulties which his continued absence will pose for you and your colleagues, but I assure you that [redacted] can give no more essential service to his government than in his present capacity, and we simply cannot spare him for another year.

I believe it was Montaigne who said something about gratitude being an appreciation of favors already received coupled with a lively sense of benefits yet to come! You and the University qualify with me on both counts, and I rest confident of your willingness to help. Incidentally, [redacted] is doing you proud as President of our Panel.

SUBJECT: Correspondence of the Director with President Sproul.

1. Last fall you wrote President Robert G. Sproul of the University of California, Berkeley, requesting that my leave of absence be extended until [redacted]. In his reply, he granted this request, but stated that it would be necessary for me to return to the University this summer.
