My dear General Smith:

Thank you very much for accepting Admiral Johnson's invitation to be the speaker at our graduation exercises at 0930, 21 December, in the Main Auditorium at the Naval Receiving Station.

So that you may have a little background, the following information is submitted:

STAT The class will graduate 73 officers which include, besides Regular and Naval Reserve male officers, one Wave, one U.S. Marine Corps officer, and [redacted] of your agency. In connection with the last-named he has been on duty at the school as a Reserve Army officer and not as a CIA member. The graduates of the school will in part go to the Language Division for linguistic training, but the majority will go to advance posts including the Office of Naval Intelligence, attache assignments, fleet assignments, and District Intelligence Offices.
