Dear General Walters:

It was certainly good to meet you at Herr-Doctor Fritz Kraemer's birthday party the other evening at Ft. McNair and to see your sister again. I've heard so much about you from Joe and Augusta Petrone:

You may find it useful to skim the attached Final Report of our "success story" in supporting ROTC during the crisis years when the Peace Movement -- sometimes in concert with SDS, Young Trotskyites and Maoists -- sought to drive ROTC off the civilian campus.

This may be a classical case history of what can be achieved by the initiative of private philanthropy working in "partnership" with universities and powerful government entities -- in this case, the Department of Defense and all Branches of the Armed Forces.

The mission was to reverse the radical trend on the campus and provide an intellectual rationale for adequate National Defense.

During the five years of the ROTC Enrichment Program, we commissioned 233 civilian professors to give 1,530 lectures to ROTC Cadets on 201 campuses.

In addition, we trained 888 Professors of Military/Aerospace Science in politico-military affairs, geoeconomics and grand strategy.
