**SUBJECT: Analysis of CinC Letters**

1. Herewith is a copy of analysis of opinions expressed in letters to the Commander-in-Chief, Far East, and other Far East Command Occupation authorities. This analysis provides a fairly accurate insight on current political, economic and sociological opinion of the Japanese people and is a valuable source of civil intelligence.

2. In furtherance of this Section's policy to liberally disseminate all vital intelligence produced in this Theater to associated units or agencies, we plan to provide you with copies of all publications which are considered to be of interest to you; this "Analysis of CinC Letters" will be followed from time to time by other intelligence publications.

3. In forwarding this material, I take the liberty to point out that in the past there have been many instances of reproduction of intelligence material produced by this Theater without reference to the original source; the danger of improper or insufficient source credit constitutes the possibility of "false verification" of information. The concern of the Department of Army in this matter is made apparent by its recent letter directive, subject: "Credit Lines on Extracts from Intelligence Publications", dated 21 March 1950, a copy of which is inclosed.
