Through a friend of mine, I have recently placed into the hands of Admiral Souers a certain formula developed by [Redacted] [Redacted] chemist working in a State-owned factory revived under my direction while I served as [Redacted] [Redacted] I trust that it has reached you and hope that it might be of some use to our common cause.

My experience in post-war [Redacted] especially that with the Soviet military authorities now appears in an entirely new light and enables me to draw what I regard as important conclusions of urgent topical nature. I plan to go to Washington very early next week and to be there Tuesday and Wednesday. Could you then see me?
