Dear G. H.:

In answer to your letter of October 19th, I should be glad to attend your editorial luncheon on November 2nd and to meet you at your office shortly after 12:00 that day. In the meantime, would it be possible for you to let me know what is expected of me at the luncheon? Obviously, I am not permitted to divulge classified information even though our discussion is off the record.

I have lectured at both the Army and the Navy War College on the organization of national intelligence and on both occasions was surprised to find out that carefully selected Army and Navy personnel of colonel and captain rank knew little about the Central Intelligence Agency or the present organization of our national intelligence system. Perhaps this is a subject of interest to your board. We could also discuss the functioning of this system in Korea which has been widely criticized or debated. Finally, as an alternative to the above topics or as a supplement to them, I might give in general language some of my personal conclusions as to Russian capabilities and intentions.

In any event, let me know what is wanted and I will tell you whether or not I am in a position to deliver it.
