
Dear Mr. Sheeley:

Dear Mr. Smith:

I teach World History at Cleveland Heights High School. At the present time we are doing research work on the negotiations of the Japanese peace treaty.

On Friday, December 30, 1949, President Truman presided over the National Security Council. He had before him a detailed "Asia Paper," which had been under preparation in the U. S. Defense and State Departments since the preceding August. Among other things, the paper dealt with the question of how and whether to proceed with a peace treaty for Japan.

Will you please send the "Asia Paper," if it is available and any other material pertaining to the Japanese peace treaty negotiations? The material you send us will be kept in our World History collection of important documents.
