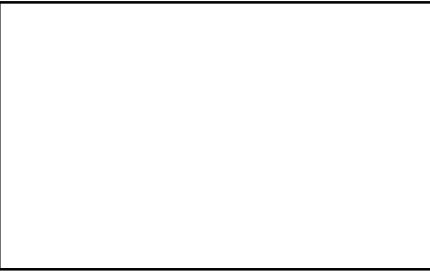

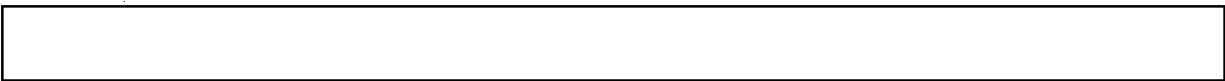

1. The Cugir factory lies midway between Alba Iulia and Deva. The main railroad line is twelve kilometers from the factory; there is a spur line which leads from the railroad to the factory site and beyond the nearby quarries. The village of Cugir has 4,000 inhabitants; it is situated in a narrow valley about three kilometers wide. There is a river nearby and the hills on either side of the valley are 1,300 meters high. The inhabitants are mainly occupied with forestry and lumber enterprises. There is a barrel-construction factory in the town as well as the Cugir factory.
2. The Cugir factories have been enlarged during the past two years. In 1935, the Rumanian Government erected this factory for the production of weapons. A section of the factory is provided for the manufacture of sewing machines.
3. The factory buildings are constructed of concrete with flat roofs; the roofs are covered with plants and foliage for camouflage purposes. The exterior walls are vari-colored for the same purpose. Along the railroad spur line near the factory there are concrete underground air raid shelters for 1000 persons.
4. In 1949 the entire factory was reconverted to the production of sewing machines; each year about 1500 machines and spare parts were manufactured.
5. On 1 July 1951, an order was issued by the Rumanian Government to reconvert the factory for the manufacture of small arms which included pistols, automatics, machine guns and ammunition for these weapons. The total number of employees in 1951 was 4,000; however, the plan was to double that figure when full production got underway.
6. The machinery used inside the factory is of German and Swiss make and said to be of excellent quality. Some of the machines are new and have never been put to use. The factory is considered to be well organized, and most employees have maintained the positions which they had held previously.
7. The factory has facilities for the production of machines to produce artificial smoke.

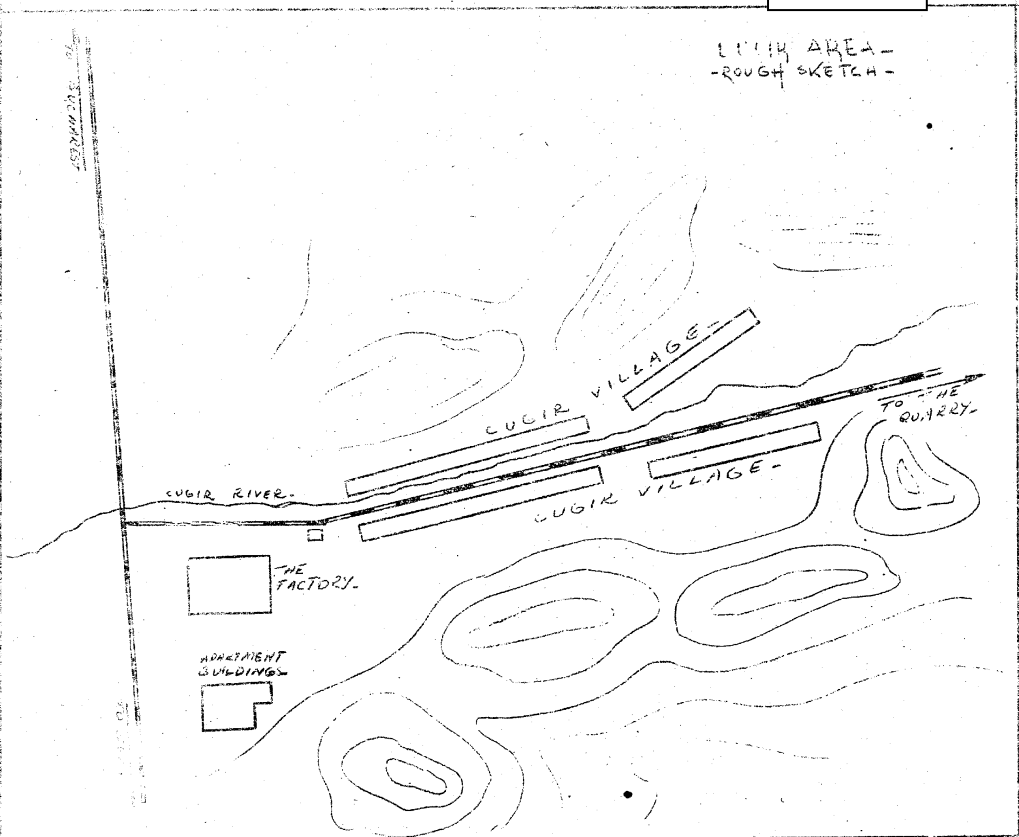


8. During World War II the factory was raided twice by American aircraft; four planes were shot down, but the factory did not suffer severe damage.
9. Directly west of the factory there are eight large buildings to house workers. It is planned that 20 more such buildings will be constructed.

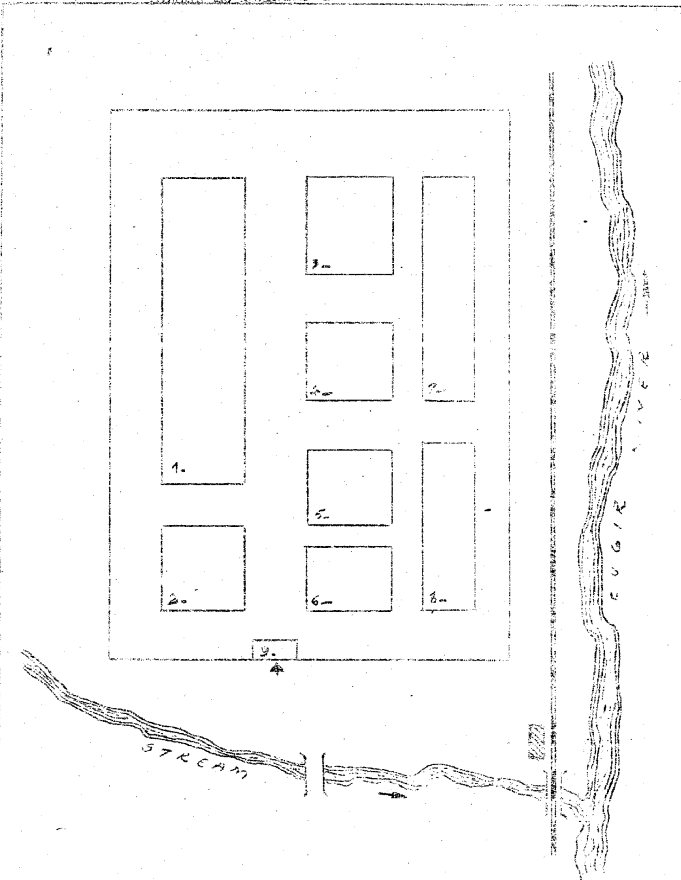
