The JCS have prepared and forwarded to SecDef recommendations for strengthening intelligence capabilities of unified and specified commands. Pending a complete evaluation of the report by SecDef, NSA will assist DDR&E in conducting a status review concerning the actions that the various U.S. Government ELINT RDT&E elements have taken on the technical program recommendations.	Continuing
12. Improve career management for intelligence personnel in military departments.	The DIA will develop programs of career management for both military and civilian personnel. These programs will be initiated by 1 July 1962.	Continuing
13. CIA open its clandestine training facilities as a matter of common concern.	CIA has primary action upon this recommendation. As a result of conferences held in November, CIA is prepared to accept DOD personnel at their clandestine training facilities, once security requirements are met for common basic training. Further action will await determination of the assignment of Defense-wide responsibility for this and other specialized types of intelligence training.	1 April 1962

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16. Establishment of a National Photographic Interpretation Center.	NPIC was established in January 1961 by NSCID 8. The center is functioning as a service of common concern, administered by CIA, with personnel provided by CIA and the military services. Experience to date has shown that the military representatives to the Staff, together with continuing liaison between DIA and the Staff, are adequate, and that no further augmentation will be required from DIA. DOD Directive 5105.21 charged the Director, DIA, with the development of DOD intelligence research and development requirements. Manning of the Research and Development Division of the Hq Staff has been delayed due to a shortage of qualified and cleared personnel in this area. It is anticipated that by 1 March 1962 manning will be sufficient to initiate liaison, with CIA and the Services, which will lead to more effective coordination of intelligence R&D.	Continuing
43. Establishment by the intelligence community of specific arrangements for planning its work and anticipating its problems.	The assigned responsibilities of DIA in the over-all coordination, management and program review of all DOD intelligence activities provides a specific arrangement for planning the work of military intelligence. DIA will, by means of representation on USIB and USIB committees, coordinate this military intelligence effort with that of the other members of the Intelligence Community. This will be particularly applicable in the extensive studies initiated by the USIB Committee on Documentation to achieve greater compatibility and efficiency in the processing of intelligence data.	Continuing
