Purpose of Meeting: To ascertain whether CARAVEL had any information of a suspicious nature regarding Deputy Chief of Police (Kriminalhauptkommissar) Martin SCHUNACK of the Wiesbaden police, or regarding the Wiesbaden police in general, or regarding certain contacts of SCHUNACK. (This was per ~~info~~ request from  of CCG/Germany, because of SCHUNACK's official involvement in the Kennedy visit to Frankfurt/Wiesbaden).

Meeting Arrangements: Meeting was arranged by a telephone call to CARAVEL. I tried to get him on Wednesday, 19 June 1963, but without success. On the second try on Thursday, 20 June, I spoke with him and he agreed to see me as soon as possible, at his office. I informed him I was leaving immediately (his was at about 1400 hrs), and would be at his office ~~in~~ shortly after 1500 hrs. He agreed.

Next Meeting: None arranged.

Operational Comments: We had a short chat, during which CARAVEL mentioned that   must be in the States by now, with which   agreed, before getting down to the real reason for   visit.   then told CARAVEL we were concerned about whether CARAVEL might know anything of a suspicious nature about ~~SCHUNACK~~ SCHUNACK.   gave him the basic data on SCHUNACK and told CARAVEL who SCHUNACK IS, and he recalled having heard the name but does not know personally.   stated that SCHUNACK had been an SS Hauptsturmfuhrer during WWII, and because of a number of rather suspicious meetings which took place at SCHUNACK's residence during the spring of 1960, we were somewhat concerned because of President Kennedy's pending visit.   explained that on a number of occasions during the period in question SCHUNACK would arrive home very late at night, and have visitors after arriving home. He was seen transferring packages from either his vehicle or from his residence to the cars of his visitors, who then left. These packages were about the size of a shoebox and wrapped in newspaper, contents unknown, but nevertheless this aroused our suspicion. Possibly the MFC, knowing of his past SS relationship might have gotten to him to blackmail, at any rate we wanted to be sure that there was ~~nothing~~ nothing known ~~about him~~ against him. CARAVEL knew of nothing personally, said the police in Wiesbaden is very good as far as he ~~knows~~ knows, the police chief is an old hand from pre-1933 days, and knows his job well, and has the Wiesbaden police under excellent control.

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CARAVEL said he ~~intentionally~~ had a couple of close friends who knew everyone, and with whom he could talk discretely, and would do so. They evidently live in the same building in which CARAVEL resides. He promised to give me the results of this by the following morning (21 June) at 1100 hrs. [ ] then gave him the names of SCHUNACK's visitors as follows:

Erich ROSSNER - DPOB 1 May 1911 at Luechtentanne/Zwickau - resides Wiesbaden, Schlangenbader Str. 20.

Karl Heinz KLOSE - DPOB 8 October 1936 at Goerlitz, resides Wiesbaden, Grisenaustr. 31.

Inge CHRISTIAN - DPOB 3 Sept. 1938 at Wiesbaden, resides Wiesbaden, Ludwigstr. 12.

Gerhard HANKE, DPOB 4 August (year unknown) at Dortmund, resides Wiesbaden, Adolfsallee 13.

Willi STANTZKI - DPOB 17 February 1903 at Wiesbaden, resides Wiesbaden, Steingasse 33.

CARAVEL made a list of the names, called a secretary, and asked her to check the card files immediately. She returned shortly to report the following: ROSSNER, CHRISTIAN, and STANTZKI, all negative. Two Gerhard HANKEs in the files, but a study of the information available led us to the conclusion ~~that~~ neither was identical with the person we were tracing. There was a file on KLOSE, but it was not in the files. CARAVEL promised to get it in the meantime and also inform me about it at 1100 hrs on the following day.

At 1100 hrs on 21 June 1963 I called and spoke with CARAVEL. He informed me the KLOSE in his files was not the same as the one we were tracing. He had checked with his friends on SCHUNACK and come up with absolutely nothing derogatory. SCHUNACK is known as a good policeman, and there is no suspicion about him whatsoever.

On 20 June during our meeting CARAVEL inquired whether we had had any proceedings at any time against SCHUNACK, and whether this had been the source of our information about SCHUNACK. [ ] shrugged his shoulders and remarked that he had no idea whatsoever where this information had come from. He accepted this without any further remarks. We chatted further and CARAVEL was very friendly throughout. He remarked that the police would certainly be extremely busy during Kennedy's visit. [ ] departed at about 1600 hrs.
