
The complex consists of a double-secured camp with barracks and a large double-fenced work area located in an area of timber exploitation near Ust'-Kut in eastern Siberia. [REDACTED]

Fragmentary reporting has suggested that forced labor has been used to construct the BAM, a strategically located railroad designed to exploit valuable east Siberian resources. But a recent review of photography found no evidence of either heavily-secured or unconfined forced laborers. This new site near Ust'-Kut is the first confirmed use of heavily-secured forced laborers in the BAM development corridor. This rail-served facility is similar to other forced labor complexes in the country engaged in logging and timber processing. The timing of the construction suggests that the Soviets plan to use forced labor to develop timber, and possibly some of the other resources of eastern Siberia. [REDACTED]
